

Clothing Drive In November

Bishop Kearney this week asked the priests and people of the Diocese to support the thirteenth annual Thanksgiving Clothing Collection for the needy of the world.

This collection of usable clothing will be held during Thanksgiving week, November 19-25.

Last year 143 parishes of the Diocese contributed a record total of 222 tons of clothing.

THE ROCHESTER diocesan project will be part of a nationwide drive to collect clothes for the world's needy.

Archbishop Karl J. Alter who heads the American bishops National Catholic Welfare Conference said this "annual appeal makes it possible... to provide clothing for millions of people in areas of great need throughout the world."

"The clothing that we are able to ship as a result of this annual appeal," said Archbishop Alter in his letter, "makes it possible for us to bolster the vast stores of government food donated to a point where we are now helping to supply the basic necessities of life to the poor in 64 countries of the globe. During the current year, the total value of our foreign relief shipments will be well over \$100 million."

Clothing collections of previous years brought in more than 135 million pounds of us-

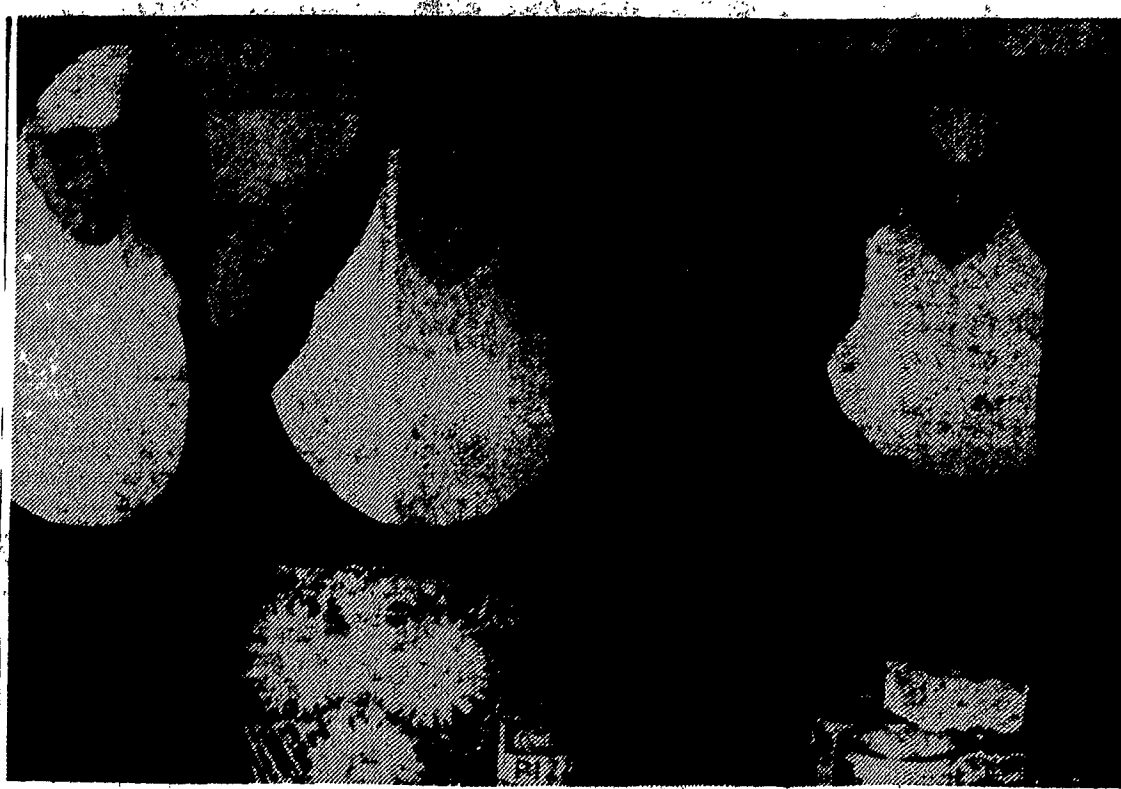
able clothing, shoes, blankets and bedding supplies. The estimated value of the supplies is put at \$160 million.

Michaelangelo Book Reviewed By Fr. Wohlrab

"A colorful portrayal of a life as turbulent as the times he lived in," was the summation of "The Agony and the Ecstasy" given last Tuesday by reviewer Father Paul Wohlrab.

He treated the biographical novel of Michaelangelo's life in the first of a series of Noonday Book Reviews being held at the Catholic Evidence Library.

IRVING STONE, author of the book, was given credit for an unusually thorough job of research in preparation for this work. Stone took his family to Italy and lived there for six years to get his background in the actual towns and streets where Michaelangelo lived.

At one point he even took a job in a stone quarry in order to get first-hand experience of stone-cutting. Stone's novel emphasizes that Michaelangelo thought of himself first as a sculptor, secondly as a painter.

His greatest painting effort, the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel, was done only as a means to an end — so that Pope Julius III would then allow him to get on with the sculpting he was really interested in.

"A rich reading experience," was Father Wohlrab's final comment. "To go through this book is to enjoy a printed travelogue of 16th century Italy."
