## Lawyer in Roman Collar

Washington — (NC) — A priest who has a law degree held by only about 30 other men in the United States received here by Chief Justice Earl A. Warren.

He is Father Martin McManus, dean of the seven-year-old Law School of the University of San Diego, Calif. He and the Chief Justice met in the Supreme Court building where they chatted and posed for photographers.

Father McManus, 42, visited Washington after commencement exercises of New York University which awarded him the degree of Doctor of Juridical Science, the highest law degree that can be earned.

He is the first priest to earn the degree at the university. He studied during summer terms in 1959 and 1960.

Father McManus, a delayed vocation, was in private law practice for ten years before studying for the priesthood. He was a trial lawyer in Los Angeles from the end of World War II, during which he served in the Navy, until he entered the seminary in 1955. He was ordained in 1959 and became law school dean in 1960.

The law school Father McManus heads is one of 22 operated by Catholics in the nation, but it is one of only two operated by dioceses rather than religious orders. In addition to the San Diego diocese's institution, the other diocesan law school is at Seton Hall University, conducted by the Newark, N.J., archdiocese.

IN AN INTERVIEW, the priest stressed his belief that Catholic law schools must be distinctive. "Law can't be taught simply as a skill, like carpentry," he said. "The ethical obligations of the lawyer must be accentuated. A good Catholic law school can do this. The student must learn the skills of law, but he must do it in the whole framework of ethics and morals."

## Book Review

Spiritual reading and the New Yorker magazine don't usually go together, but one of today's best selling novels, hailed as "spiritually significant," was lifted bodily from the New Yorker. This is J. D. Salinger's "Franny and Zooey," which will be reviewed by Father Frederick Black, C.S.B., in the Noonday Book Review program next Tuesday at 12:30 p.m. "Franny and Zooey" was originally printed in the New Yorker as two separate short stories in Nov. 5, 1955 and 1957. The two stories are related and follow each other in time sequence. By the simple expedient of publishing them in one book, Salinger has come up with a popular novel which is crowding the top of the best-selling list.
