Catholic, Orthodox Reunion Asked

Naples —(RNS)—Ameto Giovanni Cardinal Ciocegnani, Vatican Secretary of State, declared here that there were no longer any historical reasons why the Eastern Orthodox Churches should continue to remain separated from Rome.

He gave the opening address at a Week of Prayer and Study of the Christian Orient held at the Cathedral of Naples with leading ecclesiastics attending from many parts of the country.

Discussing the "unity of faith and concord deriving from recognition of the Bishop of Rome as Primate of all the Churches, both in the West and the East, that prevailed in the first centuries of Christianity," he said the reasons which finally led to the separation of the Christians of the East were "of a historical and ambiguous nature."

Among these, he said, "was the political misunderstanding whereby the Byzantine emperors claimed to be heirs to all the privileges and pomp of Rome and from which followed the desire to make Byzantium the seat of the head of the Church."

Others, he said, were "the canonical misunderstanding which arose when canon three of the First Council of Constantinople recognized the bishop of Rome as Primate of all the Churches and the liturgical misunderstanding by which the privileges of the great patriarchates were used to assert independence from Rome."

Finally, Cardinal Cocognani added, there were "the religious misunderstandings by which personal ambitions and the spirit of revenge were transposed on to theological fields."

"Now that the historical conditions from which all these misunderstandings arose have changed," he said, "there is no reason why such an unfortunate state of separation should prevail."

Sweden Admits Carmelite Nuns

Glumslöv —(RNS)—The first Catholic cloister for nuns permitted by the Swedish government in 366 years has been established here by the Carmelite Order.

Government approval of the cloister in June marked the first permit of its type since 1385, when the Swedish government barred all convents, cloisters and monasteries as the culmination of a long anti-Catholic campaign that began with the Reformation.

As time passed and religious tensions eased in the country, Religious Freedom Acts were enacted in 1781, 1860 and 1873 —but not until 1953, when Sweden passed its current Religious Freedom Act, was it legal in this Lutheran country to establish Roman Catholic cloisters and monasteries.

The Glumslöv cloister now has only two nuns in residence, although it is anticipated that five others will be added within a short time.

THE CARMELITES' application was the first to be approved since the advent of the new law, although in 1956 it was rumored that a Belgian group might ask cloister privileges in Sweden.

Cloistered nuns are enclosed in their residence, apart from the public and the world. In the case of the Carmelites here, the order must meet several requirements set up by the Religious Freedom Act of 1953.

Those regulations are: Only women over 25 may take the vow and their vows must not bar them from later withdrawal from the order;

The vows must not entail any curtailment of the personal freedom guaranteed to all Swedish citizens by Swedish law;

Public authorities must be entitled to visit the cloisters and keep themselves informed of its activities; and

The government must be able to get in direct contact with individual members of the cloister.

WHILE THE Carmelites will have the first cloistered unit in Sweden, there are already 11 religious orders or congregations operating in the country. The largest and oldest is the Sisters of Elizabeth with 77 members. Since 1864 it has operated nursing homes in Stockholm, Malmö and Gävle and offers mobile sick care in and around Norrköping. Most of the sisters are German and Polish.

The Order of the Most Holy Savior (Sisters of St. Brigitta) have convents in Stockholm and Västana.

In commenting on approval of the cloister, Budbareren, a weekly published by the Evangelical National Society said: "If it is legal to set up atheistic associations of various kinds in our country, it would be unreasonable to put obstacles in the way of the practicing of Roman piety."

Sweden is estimated to have 26,000 Catholics. The Diocese of Stockholm which covers all of Sweden, is headed by Bishop Ansgar Nelson, O.S.B. Bishop Nelson, born in Denmark, came to the U.S. in 1925, was converted to Catholicism two years later, and joined the Benedictine Order.

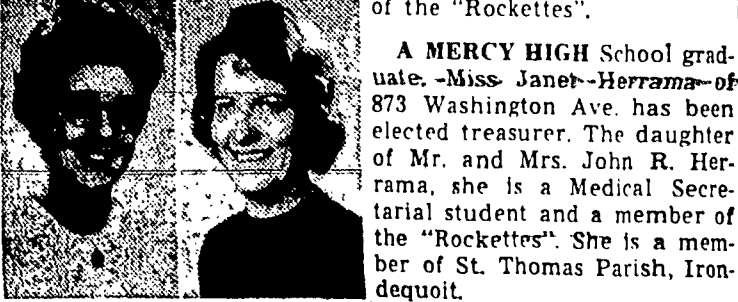

Bonn — (RNS) — Albertus Magnus, noted Benedictine theologian, philosopher and scientist, revered as a "Universal Doctor" by the Catholic Church, is pictured on a new set of stamps issued by the West German government. The portrait of Albertus Magnus will appear on the five-pennig value of the "Famous Germans" series designed for regular postal use in West Germany and West Berlin.

The volume of his writings exceeded only by those of his contemporary, St. Thomas Aquinas. He died in 1280 and was beatified by Pope Gregory XV in 1622.

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
