

Aquinas Ends Season With 5-3 Record

Another impressive football record has been established by the Little Irish of Aquinas Institute even though they lost their last two games of the season.

Mentor Joe Repko, completing his sixth year as coach and his able assistant, Basil Marella, led the Irish to a five win, three loss record which shows the Maroon and White accumulated a total of 158 points in eight games while dropping 97 points to opponents.

The EXPERTS in their pre-season appraisals referred to the Little Irish of 1961 as a team to be reckoned with. With a mighty forward wall and speedy backfield, coupled by clever quarterbacks, the Irish presented a threat to any team in the area.

But few teams in western New York care to play Aquinas, except, perhaps when they have a powerhouse.

Looking for formidable foes which can accurately test the local boys' talent, Aquinas schedule makers turned first to Ohio, a hotbed of school boy football, and signed up St. Joseph's of Cleveland, undisputed city champs, and then to Pennsylvania for Kingston and North Catholic of Pittsburgh, both winners of the local scholastic gridiron laurels.

AQUINAS HAD little trouble with Kingston, winning 19-0. Cleveland and Pittsburgh presented different pictures. In the prep school class both schools simply outclassed the Irish.

"We gave our best effort of the year in those two games," Repko said. "We had a rough time with Cleveland and the boys were pretty banged-up. But, all in all, they played well and we have nothing to be ashamed of. A good many coaches would be put to quite a test by either of those two schools."

Schedule makers are again at work at Aquinas and one thing is certain, the Little Irish will not be looking for easy games. Father Carter, athletic director, not only has invited Cleveland and Pittsburgh back to Rochester, but also has contacted other schools in the Ohio and Pennsylvania areas with offers for future games.

Defensive end Al Wagner chipped in with a vital fumble recovery early in the final period when Notre Dame was within 10 yards of a tying touchdown. He pounced on a ball that had been knocked loose by junior tackle Steve Ladion Guila.

Defensive stalwarts Ted Fink and Bill Soehner came up with another fine job of road-blocking, much of it unnoticed, and offensive guard Henry Cashette and Joe Pilato were in on both scoring moves. The tenth senior, Dave Bosseler, saw duty as a reserve end on defense.

Fink, incidentally, was involved in an unusual intra-family rivalry with his brother Dick, who played well in a losing cause for Notre Dame. The Finks live in Bergen, which is about equal distance from the two schools. Both boys are sen-

iors, but this was the first time they had met on the gridiron.

ALTHOUGH IT was the seniors' day to shine, the junior contributions again counted heavily. Ralph Camardo's running was a big factor in the first score, while Tisa, Tom Green and Joe Hallett were able on defense, and Tom Falter added some good punting.

With almost a score of juniors back next season, it's not surprising that coaches Joe Mancarella and Tom Seymour are looking forward to what could be a banner campaign.
