GOD LOVE YOU!

Although we are scandalized at Sartre who, in his own atheistic way, said, "Other people are hell," it is too true that some persons are largely interested in their own problems. But the contrary must be emphasized. We do not save ourselves alone; we pray in the context of "Our Father," not "My Father." Our economies are social; we ask for "our daily bread," that is bread for the people of India and Vietnam, not just "my bread." Pardon is not asked for "my sins" alone; we beg forgiveness for "our trespasses." The concern with self is especially evident in today's fanatical building of fallout shelters and subsequent discussions of the shooting of an intruder, which are at variance with the conclusion of the "Our Father": "Deliver us from evil." This means not just me and my family, but the Russians, the Finns and the Chinese.

Oh, Heavenly Father, if our people would only be Catholic, universal-minded, missionary! If only they would understand that the highest use any one of us can make of his or her personality is to do away with the go in it and to give it to others wholly and unreservedly. Take us priests — we tell our people about a worthy cause and ask our people to be generous. But how many of us reach into our pockets to prove that we mean it when we say a cause is worthy?

The Holy Father does! This year, as every year, His Holiness ordered a special collection on Mission Sunday for The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. But he did not authorize that appeal until He Himself had given a million lira to the cause. Consider also the action of The Congregation of the Propaganda in Rome, which recently received the gift of an automobile. They sold it and gave its value to the General Fund of The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. If the missionaries were poor, then so would the heads of the Missions be poor.

If, then, there is this deep sense of otherness in those who have charge of the Missions of the world, would you not share in it too? For \$20 a month, you could hire a catechist who will teach Africans and Japanese the Faith until a priest is ready to baptize them. Have you ever made a convert? Have you ever saved a soul? You do not want to go to God childless and fruitless, do you? Then why not deny yourself some small pleasure for a month or for a year, that other people may not be hell to you, but that they may be heaven? Just remember that The Society for the Propagation of the Faith is the Holy Father's own society to aid all missions in all places. He asks that he be "first and principally aided." And those are not my words — they are his. Will you not help love all men through him? Thank you.
