

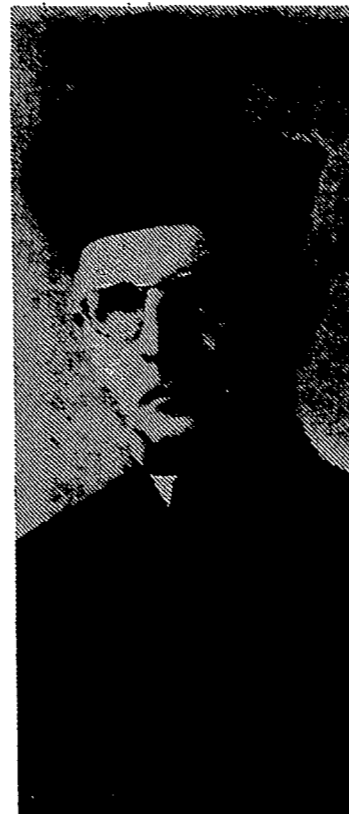
Income Campaign Opens In Lima

With the formation of the Executive Committee, St. Rose Parish Financial Need Appeal was officially underway, it was announced by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John M. Ball, V.F. pastor and honorary chairman of the program.

Purpose of the program is to provide funds to remedy present building repair needs, among them a new exit for the school, an additional exit for the church, new porches for the church rear exits, tuck-pointing the exterior and re-leading the church windows.
