Fisher, Nazareth Schedule Christian Culture Seminar
Students and faculty members of Nazareth and St. John Fisher Colleges will join for a new Christian culture seminar course beginning in February. Eight students from each school and five faculty members will participate in the course which marks another step in the cooperative educational experiment launched by the two colleges last year.

TOPIC of the seminar will be "Liberty and Authority in Contemporary American Social and Political Life." Discussions will revolve around the reciprocal rights and obligations of individual citizens and their democratic institutions.

Participating faculty members from St. John Fisher will be the Rev. Dr. Robert Miller, C.S.B., chairman of the department of philosophy, Professor Stefan Maczynski of the political science department and Mrs. William Harvey, acting chairman of the history department. Nazareth will be represented by Sister Stephen Mary, S.S.J., of the philosophy department and Sister Mary Lourdes, S.S.J., of the theology department.

During the 15-week course, students and faculty will discuss some of the major problems of contemporary American social and political democratic life. The extent of liberty and the limits of authority in all phases of the democratic social structure will be analyzed.
