Louis Valenza Honored

A highlight of the tenth anniversary dinner of The American Committee on Italian Migration held at the Commodore Hotel, New York, on Dec. 9 was the presentation of a decoration from the Republic of Italy to Louis A. Valenza, left, former Rochester insurance, civic and charity leader.

VALENZA RECEIVED the decoration Star of Solidarity, Order of Merit of the Republic of Italy, from Italian Ambassador to the United States, Sergio Fenoaltea, right. Also participating in the presentation was Marchesa Ruggero di Villaforte, Consul General of Italy in New York.

The dinner which was attended by more than 1,000 persons from the U.S. included numerous dignitaries comprising government, civic, church and business leaders. Presently, A.C.I.M.

has 120 chapters throughout the U.S. The main address at the dinner was made by the Hon. Edward M. Kennedy, assistant district attorney, Boston, a brother of the President. Ambassador Fenoaltea also extended greetings to the assemblage in English and Italian.

Messages also were received from Pope John, President Kennedy, former President Eisenhower, Hon. Antonio Segni, foreign minister, Republic of Italy, and Cardinals Spellman, Cushing, McIntyre and Meyer. Many other messages were received from members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives and state governors. Among these were the Hon. Jacob J. Javits and the Hon. Kenneth B. Keating, New York Senators, and Governor Rockefeller.

Valenza long has been active in civic and charitable work in Rochester and was founder of the A.C.I.M. Rochester chapter and is its treasurer. He also was organizer of the Italian Civic League of Rochester, a federation of 31 fraternal organizations, which he also served as president. He now is honorary president of the League. Under the auspices of the League, Valenza organized the Rochester chapter of American Relief for Italy and served as chairman of the Ways and Means Committee.

HIS EFFORTS on behalf of these groups and A.C.I.M. have resulted in raising many thousands of dollars for relief and assistance of Italian immigrants. Born in Italy, he came to the United States in 1915 and entered the life insurance business in 1926.

Valenza also is a member of the Rochester Rehabilitation Commission. Another activity that has occupied a major part of his life is the Calanietta Society which he has served as president for the past 35 years.

Valenza and his wife, the former Rosa Anzalone, reside at 2333 Clifford Ave. They have one child, a daughter, Angelina, who is a high school teacher.

Fr. Weckesser Speaks In Livonia Center

Livonia Center—Prayers and personnel was the plea of Father James Weckesser, Maryknoll Mission in Central Chile at a meeting of St. Michael's Church Altar and Rosary Society.

Father Weckesser, a former member of St. Augustine's Church in Rochester, has spent six years in central Chile and is returning there this month. He has been home since June.

PERSONNEL is the need of the missions at the present time in a country where communism is spreading rapidly. Father said that the communists win the people by great promises but actually they do nothing. Working especially in the slum areas they gain headway by joint organizations and working until they receive the coveted office where they have a ruling voice. The mines are almost completely communistic and now they are working the farmers.

Members of the Maryknoll Order have been in Chile, mostly in the farm areas, for 17 years. Forty priests oversee 17 parishes, 20 schools with the help of 35 Sisters, 10 native sisters and five Brothers. They receive a subsidy from the government to help with the operation of the schools, provided they comply with state regulations.

A parish numbers from 7,000 to 15,000 persons and only 1500 of these live near enough to attend Mass regularly. Most of the parishes have mission stations where the traveling missionary makes regular visits.

FATHER WECKESSER said that their greatest wish is that

they can get to the people before the Communists reach them.

Women of St. Mary's Church, Horseye were guests at the meeting. Both groups are now soliciting used Christmas cards and Holy Communion dresses for the Maryknoll missions.

Mrs. Frances Panipito, foreign relief chairman, reported that a sum of \$25 was collected at the Christmas dinner for the Madonna Plan.

Fisher Prof Gives Talks

Dr. Benedict B. O'Malley, chairman of the Department of Biology at St. John Fisher College, presented two papers dealing with the biochemistry of cancer at the Annual Meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), on Dec. 29 at Denver, Colo.

The papers were presented in the meetings of the chemical section.

Dr. O'Malley discussed: "Carcinogenic Agents and the Dynamic of the RE System in Tumors"; and "The Use of Fluorescent Techniques to Elucidate the Carcinolytic Process." He has been collaborating in this research area with Dr. Robert Willim, director of Cancer Research at the Trafalgar Hospital Institute of Applied Biology, and Dr. Paul Sluss of the Department of Biochemistry of the University of Miami Medical College.
