Of interest to all who are eager and interested in prompt good television programs is the news that the series of thirteen half-hour films of the TV Hour of St. Francis has been accepted by WROCTV, Channel 5, for viewing on Sunday mornings from 10 to 10:30. The fourth in the series, "The Third Devil" will appear on Sunday, Jan. 28.

In "The Third Devil," a fantasy presented by Pat O'Brien, Satan faces a depression in hell, and sends three young devils to drum up business. The result is an old but never antiquated technique for temptation.

The production of the films is a completely nonprofit, charitable enterprise, sponsored by the Third Order of St. Francis, whose universal members have pledged their prayers and financial support as a missionary effort.

Members of the Third Order are also requested to pray for the success of the endeavors of the Rochester unit of the Catholic Interracial Council, who, with the cooperation of the Third Order of St. Francis, will mark the second diocesan observance of "Interracial Sunday," and the beginning of "National Brotherhood Week" on Sunday, Feb. 18.

DeWohl History Lauded By Book Reviewer

"Most Church historians know too much about their subject to try to compress the history of the Catholic Church into one small volume. A skilful literary man, who's not afraid to walk in 'where angels fear to tread,' may tackle the work and bring it off rather well. To his credit, Louis de Wohl has done a remarkable job of compression."

SO SPOKE the Rev. Robert McNamara when he treated "Founded On a Rock," de Wohl's popular history of the Catholic Church. Father McNamara, himself a professor of Church History at St. Bernard's Seminary was the speaker at last Tuesday's Noonday Book Review held at the Catholic Evidence Library.

"De Wohl's historical novels on the saints actually gave him a good start on a history of the Church. Besides showing a novelist's skill, this work reflects the ability of a conscientious researcher," the reviewer continued.

"Because he thinks like a novelist, he emphasizes the dramatic moments which highlight the story of the Church. Again to his credit, he chooses the right moments, those which really do reflect the spirit of the particular age."

De Wohl's mistakes are relatively few, and rather traditional ones, Father McNamara said. St. Paul falling from his horse (the Bible mentions no horse), St. Bernard's authorship of the "Salve Regina" (the Catechism as a regular gathering place for Christian worship, but these time-worn misconceptions in no way detract from the accuracy of the book.

"Mr. De Wohl has done a real service in providing an attractive, readable history of the Church," was Father McNamara's summation of "Founded On a Rock."
