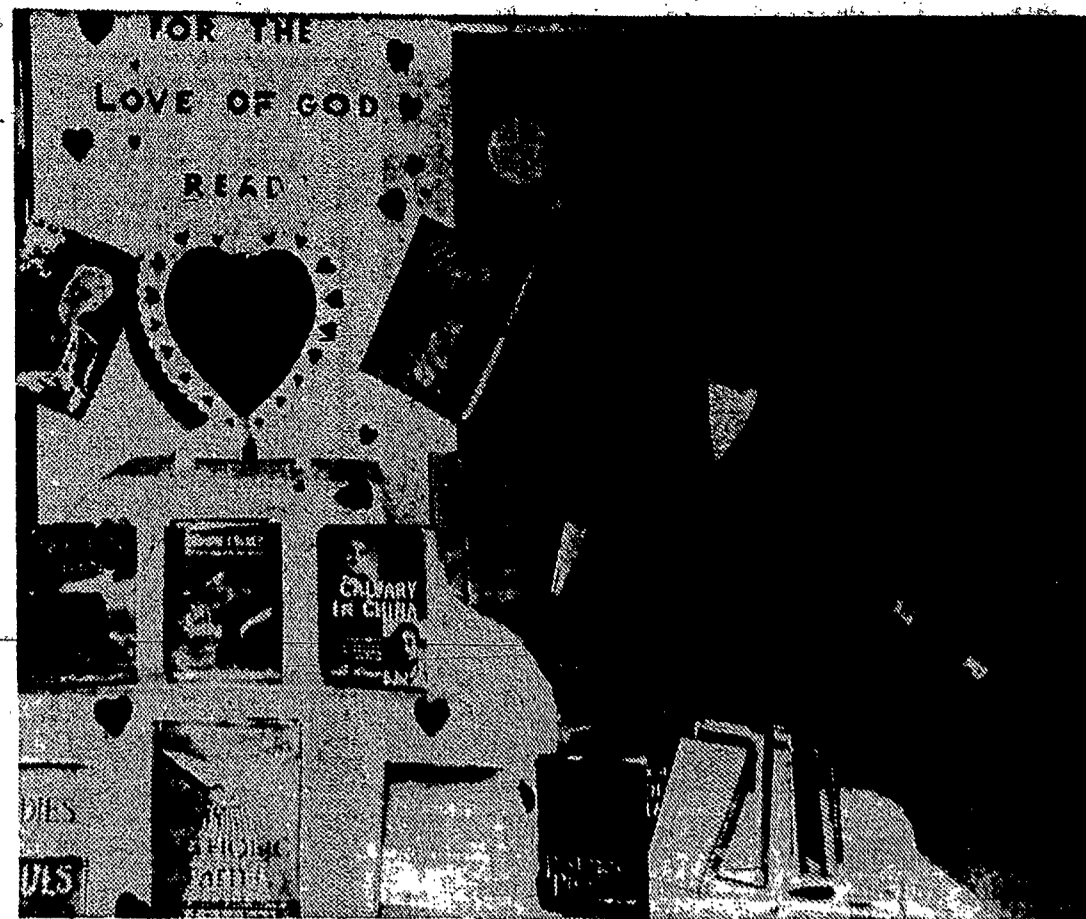

Eagle Awards Given To St. Stephen's Scouts

Geneva — For the first time in 21 years, Troop 8, St. Stephen's Boy Scouts of America has given the Eagle Scout award. Three boys of Troop 8 attained the rank this year.

They are David and Daniel Marks, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Marks of 784 Pre-Emption Rd., and Anthony Visco, son of Mr. and Mrs. Visco of 499 Castle St.

THE BADGES were awarded last week. The meeting was opened by Orlando D'Augustino, institutional representative for the troop. In a short talk he described the work and initiative needed to become an Eagle Scout.

Among the guests at the ceremony were Mayor Donald J. Eades, Dr. Verne Marshall, Finger Lakes Boy Scout Council president, and Ray Smith, council district executive.

Troop 8 was organized March 21, 1925. Its first Eagle Scout was Richard Everitt in 1928. In 1932 Bernard DeVaney received the honor and in 1941 John O'Malley, John Skinner and Alan Guard attained Eagle Scout rank.

Dave Marks joined Troop 8 in June of 1957 and worked his way up to junior assistant scoutmaster. Dan Marks joined in September of 1958. He now holds the rank of senior patrol leader and specializes in the instruction of the Morse code.

Tony Visco also joined the troop in 1958. He has been a patrol leader and is now an assistant senior patrol leader. He instructs younger scouts in various scouting crafts.

All three Eagle Scouts have earned more than the necessary 21 merit badges.
