

New Units Proposed At Men's College

The Board of Advisory Regents of St. John Fisher College has selected a national firm of architects to design a master plan for the college. It was announced this week by the Rev. Charles J. Lavery, C.S.B., president of the college, following a special meeting of the Board. Robert E. Giffa is chairman of the Planning Committee.

THE ARCHITECTURAL firm of Giffels and Rossetti of Detroit, Michigan, has been chosen for the preparation of the master plan which, according to Father Lavery, will ultimately include fourteen buildings.

The architects are preparing plans for a dormitory which will house 200 students and will be ready for occupancy in September 1963.

Preliminary sketches are being prepared for a classroom and faculty office building and a gymnasium. This will be the first phase in the long term plans for the development of the college. The construction of these buildings will follow the building of the dormitory.

The firm of Giffels and Rossetti has done extensive work for the University of Michigan and Michigan State University. Recently they completed an entire unit at Dearborn for the University of Michigan, comprising campus layout, engineering building, student center, classroom building and faculty building.

LOUIS ROSSETTI, chief architect of the firm, who will direct the project at St. John Fisher, was born in Paris and educated in Germany. He continued his education in Rome and received a doctorate in Architectural Engineering. He came to the United States in 1924 and worked under the famous architect Albert Kahn. Rossetti, who designed Cobo Hall, the artistic convention center in Detroit, is a registered architect in 35 states. He is the holder of many awards for his architectural designs.

Revise Law On Quotas

Chicago — (RNS) — Auxiliary Bishop Aloysius J. Wycislo of Chicago, a son of Polish immigrants, was honored here by the American Committee on Italian Migration for his many years of work among newly-arrived immigrants in this country.

In an address to the gathering, Bishop Wycislo called for a revision of the country's immigration quota system in favor of those countries where economic opportunities for the population are poor.

Bishop Wycislo, who for 16 years was assistant executive director of Catholic Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference before he was created a Chicago auxiliary in 1960, was presented with the first gold medal to be awarded by the ACIM.

Presentation of the medal was made to him at the 10th anniversary dinner commemorating the founding here of the Chicago chapter of ACIM. More than 800 persons attended the affair.

CDA Poetry Contest Open To Students, Nuns
