### Syracuse Drive Tops Goal

Syracuse — Pledges totaling \$7,176,000—30% over the minimum goal — were announced first week in fund drives for expansion of Catholic high schools in the Syracuse Diocese.

Objective of the campaigns is the proposed construction of two new central high schools in the Syracuse area (Onondaga County) and one in Binghamton. The three schools will accommodate 3,400 boys and girls.

Bishop Walter A. Pory announced pledge results as follows: Onondaga County—Goal, \$4,000,000; Pledged, \$5,432,451; Bingham Area — Goal, \$1,500,000; Pledged, \$1,730,000. A similar drive for a Catholic high school in the city of Rome, with a goal of \$750,000, is now being organized.

Aiding in the organization and direction of all three campaigns is the firm of Foley Associates Inc., of Rochester, N.Y., a national Catholic fund-raising counsel.

Four Aquinas Institute seniors have been named finalists in the New York State Council, Knights of Columbus scholarships.

Frederick Stutsman, Samuel Amico, Leon Sawyko and Joseph Greiner were informed by Herman P. Wolkenberg of Middletown, chairman of the scholarship committee, that they have been called to compete in the finals.

THIRTY COLLEGE scholarships amounting to \$30,000 are awarded annually to high school candidates who are good Catholics and who reside in New York State. Choice of winners is made on the basis of competition in the College Board Examinations. The preliminary examination was held Jan. 13. Stutsman and Amico ranked first and second, respectively.

Three scholarships worth \$3,000 are awarded to the eight county area between Buffalo and Syracuse. For these scholarships nine students who have scored the highest in the scholastic aptitude tests of the College Boards were named finalists. The final choice will be made on the basis of excellence in the achievement tests to be administered this month. Final announcement will be made in May.

All finalists are also winners of New York State Regents Scholarships.
