

# 'Early Church' Spirit Said Needed Now

St. Louis — (RNS) — The best method of getting Catholic laity to participate in the liturgy of the Mass is to return to the spirit that characterized the early Catholic Church, the executive secretary of the National Catholic Liturgical Conference said here.

John B. Mannion told some 1,400 priests, nuns, religious and laity attending the first St. Louis Regional Liturgical Days that the early Christians could not only see what was going on, but they could understand the language.

Another visitor to the regional conference, Father Frederick R. McManus, outgoing president of the National Conference, said "it never occurred to these early Christians that the priest would say these things silently. Our Lord at the Last Supper said these things out loud, and the apostles responded. In the early days of the Church the idea of responding and singing together was always there."

"It will take time, but it is coming," he said. "What makes it so difficult is that it involves so many changes for both priests and people. It isn't easy for people to change their ways, and it takes more than a mandate from on high to make them do it. They have got to get used to the idea, and it takes time."

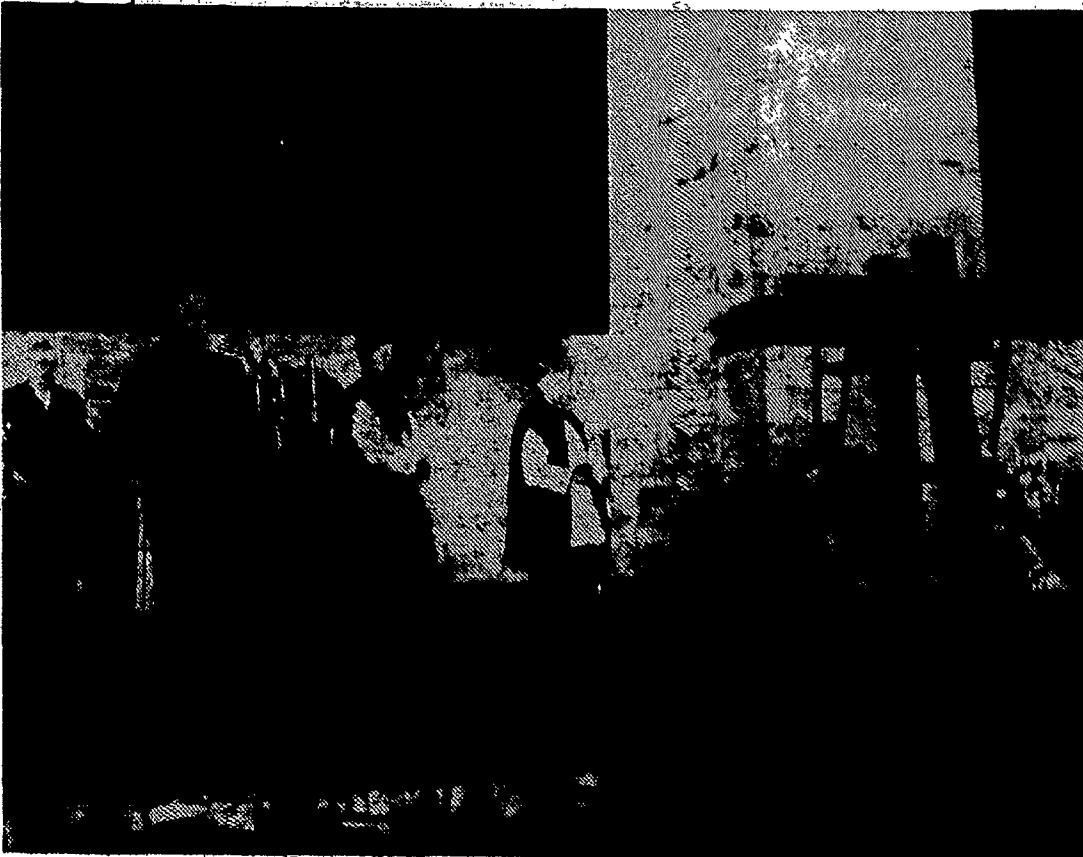

## Montezuma Seminary Alliance for Spiritual Progress

Montezuma, N.M. — (NC) — The U.S. had begun as early as U. S. Grant, Queen Victoria's 1915, when anticlerical government sister the Princess Louise, the German Kaiser and the Emperor of Japan.

Yet out of this time of hardship for the Church arose an institution whose existence testifies to the enduring faith of Mexican Catholics and their brothers in the United States.

This unique institution is the Montezuma Seminary, where in the past 25 years 1,200 priests have been prepared and ordained for service in their homeland.

The Montezuma Seminary will celebrate its silver jubilee September 8 with impressive ceremonies here and in nearby Las Vegas, N.M. More than 300 priest-alumni of the seminary, including seven Mexican bishops who studied there, are expected to attend the rites.

EFFORTS TO establish a Mexican national seminary in

the U.S. had begun as early as U. S. Grant, Queen Victoria's 1915, when anticlerical government sister the Princess Louise, the German Kaiser and the Emperor of Japan.

## Send People Says Prelate

Washington — (NC) — The best gift that can be sent to the Church in troubled Latin America is professional people who will be sorely missed in their homeland. This is the opinion of Msgr. Ivan Illich, a dynamic New York priest who directs two Centers of Inter-cultural Formation for volunteers preparing to serve the Church in South America.

THE CENTERS — one in Mexico, the other in Brazil — put selected students from the United States, Canada and Europe through a four-month course of language preparation, cultural adaptation and spiritual formation.

The course is generally conceded to be the most demanding offered any volunteers in the major program now under way by Church agencies to help Catholicism in Latin America meet the challenges facing it there.

Of the 180 students who have started since the course began last year, only 80 have finished.

# Breakdown of Prejudice

Heythrop, England — (RNS) — The "deepest chasm" dividing Roman Catholics and Non-Catholics arises from Catholic suspicion between Catholics and teaching concerning the nature of the Church, its hierarchical constitution and its authority in matters of doctrine and discipline, Augustin Cardinal Bea, president of the Vatican Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, declared here.

He told a press conference at the Jesuit College that in weighing the difficulties in the way of unity, "one might even speak of mountains."

ONE SHOULD never forget these, "nor should one delude oneself about them," he told the newsmen.

The German-born cardinal came to the college for an ecumenical conference sponsored by the British hierarchy's Committee on Christian Unity.

Asked what advance he thought was likely to be made by the forthcoming Second Vatican Council in the search for unity, he said the Council could improve the general atmosphere between Catholics and communities of Non-Catholic Christians.

The cardinal noted that there had been some breaking-down of prejudices and a clearing of Catholic suspicion between Catholics and others, but he stressed that these "still exist on both sides to a high degree."

"We have only just begun to move toward one another," he said adding that "we cannot expect that the prejudices and misunderstandings created through many very sad centuries can be overcome in a few years."

Attending the ecumenical talks here were five bishops and 70 priests, two from each of England's dioceses and major religious orders. Primary aim of the discussions was to instruct the clergy on the nature of ecumenical work in Britain.

It was announced that a television program featuring Cardinal Bea and other conference speakers will be shown over the national commercial network, probably before the opening of the Second Vatican Council of Oct. 11. The program will

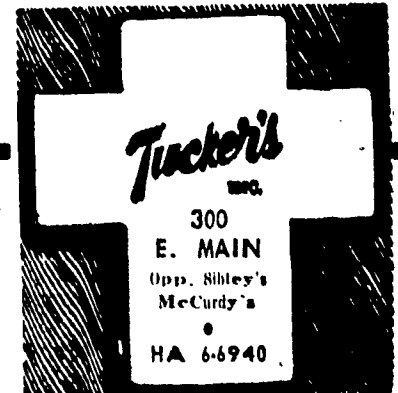

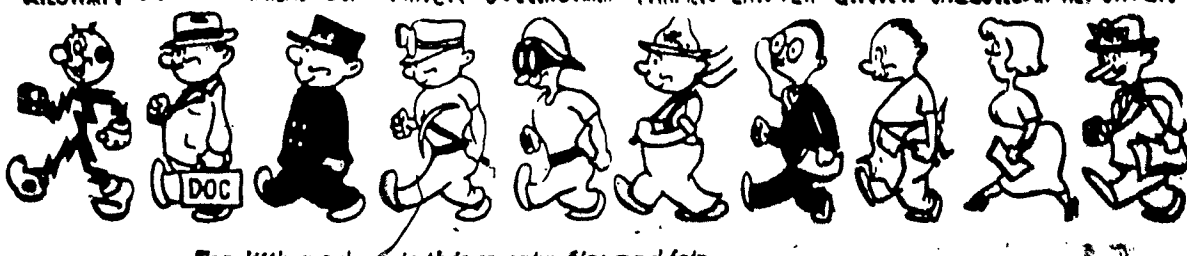

Six little workers—glad to be alive. But Uncle snatched the steel mills—then there were five.

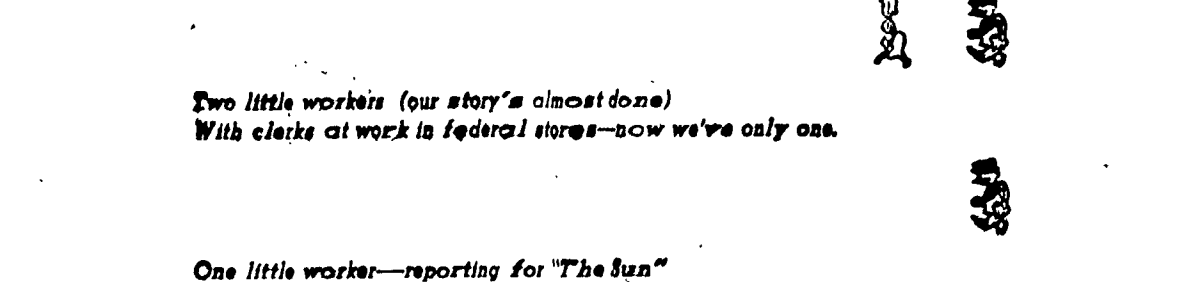
Five little workers—'til the farms are free no more. Having been collectivized—then there were four.
