Faculty Increase

To meet the needs of its school population Nazareth Academy has increased the number of lay teachers on its faculty.

With a registration of more than 1400 students this year, its faculty, including administrators, and office personnel, numbers 81: a school chaplain, 63 Sisters of St. Joseph, 14 lay teachers (12 full time and 2 part time), and 3 lay office assistants.

LAY TEACHERS supplementing the religious faculty will be represented in areas of business education, driver education, modern languages, music, physical education, science and social studies.

Mrs. Butkoff, trained at the University of Sofia, Bulgaria, and the University of Munich, Germany, comes to Nazareth from Syracuse University where she has been teaching Russian, Bulgarian, and French in the university's Eastern European Language Program. At Nazareth she will teach French and also Russian, which has been included in the curriculum for the first time this year.

Mrs. Boyle, a physical education major from the University of Connecticut, will teach in the physical education department of Nazareth. She has taught in California, Virginia, and in New York State.

Two Nazareth College graduates will teach in the business department. Mrs. Nizer has taught at St. Agnes High School, and in the Rochester Public Schools. Miss Corbelli completed her college education last June.

Miss Gibbons, a graduate of Misericordia College, Pa., will teach social studies.

Miss Strachan, a graduate of Nazareth College and of the Catholic University's speech and drama department in the graduate school, will teach in the English department.

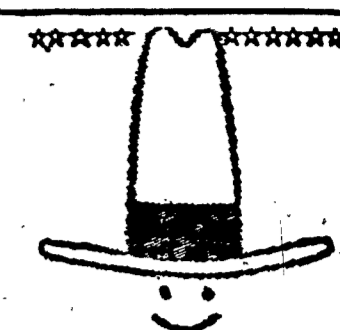
