

Youth Adoration Hour To Resume

Catholic Youth Adoration Holy Hour will be held at St. Joseph's Church, Sunday, Sept. 16 from 7 to 8 p.m. The Holy Hour is for all young people of the Diocese and high schoolers are urged to attend. The Rev. Michael Volpe, Diocesan Director of Sodalties will conduct the Holy Hour and the Rev. Robert Downs, assistant pastor of St. Plus X Church will preach the sermon.

The Catholic Youth Adoration Holy Hour, now in its 11th year here in Rochester, was founded by the Rev. Joseph Bernier, S.S.S., a Blessed Sacrament Father at the Church of St. Jean Baptiste in New York City.

FATHER BERNIER has given retreats for high schoolers here. He will conduct and preach the Holy Hour in October. One of his books is used for the prayers of the Holy Hour.

"High schoolers, parents, all must realize the tremendous importance of this monthly Holy Hour, as a source of grace," Father Volpe said, this week. "It is a means of developing a deep personal relationship of

love between Our Lord and the Teenager—that will affect the teenager's studies, home and social life."

More than 50,000 hours of prayer have been offered by the young people of Rochester during these past 10 years through Catholic Youth Adoration. The Holy Hour is sponsored by the Diocesan Sodality Union.

Scholarships covering tuition expenses will be available to certified teachers with three or more years of teaching experience.

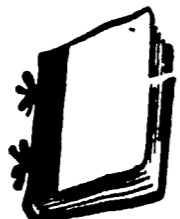
Girls Needed At Hospital

Pamela Moss Funeral Held In Penfield Church

All funerals are sad but that of a child, especially so.

And particularly if the child died a victim of a brutal and warped mind.

Such was the funeral Mass for Pamela A. Moss, 14 year old Penfield schoolgirl, offered in St. Joseph's Church Tuesday morning.

Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey gave the final blessing and spoke briefly.

"Ordinarily no sermon is given after a funeral Mass," he said. "The Church believes that the Mass itself will help the soul of the deceased more than any eulogy. We are not going to preach any sermon this morning but only tell Pamela's parents and her family that they have the heartfelt sympathy and the prayers not only of all the people of Penfield but of the whole Rochester community."

"From what we have heard of Pamela's beautiful Christian character, she should now be in heaven or close to it. From her home in heaven she will pray for you whom she loved."

"All of us, your neighbors and friends, will pray that God will give you the strength to carry the heavy cross He has placed on your shoulders, and He will."

Bishop Kearney earlier visited the funeral home where he offered prayers for Pamela.

Celebrant of the funeral Mass was Rev. John D. Malley; Rev. Raymond Booth was deacon and Rev. George Kalb, subdeacon.
