

Current NCCM Film Catalogue Available

New York — (NC) — The 1962-63 film catalogue of the National Council of Catholic Men published here contains 150 titles, most of which are film prints of programs produced by the NCCM in cooperation with the three major TV networks — ABC, CBS and NBC.

Four new series and four new subjects highlight the catalogue. The series are:

The new four-part series on "America and Communism," utilizing the technique of documentary, concert reading, and discussion, and presenting an up-to-date look at communism.

"THE NEW 'Prejudice-U.S.A.'" series, using dramatic style, examining prejudice in relationship to the Negro, the Jew, and the Catholic.

"Landscape of the Soul," a new four-part series, studies the interior life of man. The series was written for NCCM by the Dominican playwright, Father Dominic Rover, O.P.

The new three-part series on "Catholic Television International," is an anthology of Catholic television programs produced by other countries.

Among the new single subjects are "A Portrait of Guardian," on one of the Church's leading theologians; "Maryknoll: A Gift of Freedom," the story of the Maryknoll Sisters; "The Death of Judas," one of the most popular NCCM TV productions ever presented; and for the first time a one hour subject, "The Saintmaker's Christmas Eve," adapted by

Specific purchases which will be made include that of a "reach-in" type incubator for the genetics laboratory course in biology and for two undergraduate calibre spectrophotometers and a versatile potentiometer "pH" meter for use in such courses as analytical chemistry, physical chemistry and senior research programs.

College Offers Adult Courses

Sister St. Catherine, dean of Nazareth College, announced this week that the women's college on East Avenue, Pittsford, is offering a number of courses to alumnae and other adults.

On Mondays from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. the art department is scheduling an art course, especially designed for amateur and non-professional artists. Art concepts will consist of a one-hour lecture followed by a two-hour studio, in which participants will be involved in the execution of projects in which they may be interested.

The language courses will be included in the program—elementary Spanish on Saturdays from 1:30 to 4 p.m. and elementary Russian Tuesday and Thursday at 10:30 and Friday at 8:30 a.m. Work in the language laboratory will be a part of each of these courses.

Other courses open to alumnae and other adults will be history of art (lectures, slides, field trips) on Monday, 9:30

a.m. and Tuesday and Thursday, 8:30 a.m.; music appreciation, Monday, Wednesday, Friday at 1:30 p.m.; world literature, Mon., Wed. and Friday at 1:30 p.m.; medieval history, Mon., Wed. and Friday at 3:30 p.m.

Dr. Charles Mills will offer a course on the Napoleonic period on Saturday afternoons from 1:30 to 3 p.m.

Courses of special interest to teachers in public and parochial elementary schools will be offered on Saturdays from 1:30 to 3:00 p.m. A New York State sponsored mathematics course, covering the "new" mathematics in grades 1 to 6, will again be taught by Sister Barbara Ann, S.S.J., Ph.D., who for the past several summers has taught in the National Science Foundation programs at Notre Dame University. A course in reading methods and one in classroom administration will also be offered to elementary teachers.

All classes will be conducted on the East Avenue campus.
