Versage has been an assistant

professor of sociology at Stonehill College in Massachusetts since 1960. Prior to that he was an assistant professor at the University of Dayton and an instructor at St. Francis College and St. Basil's Seminary.

HE RECEIVED a bachelor of science degree from Niagara University in 1947 and a master of arts degree from Columbia University in 1951. Additional graduate study in sociology and anthropology has been conducted at Boston College, Harvard University, the University of Rochester and Brandeis University. This year he was awarded a National Science Foundation grant to participate in the 1962 Summer Institute in Anthropology at the University of California at Berkeley.

Miss Koenig has been a lecturer in physics at the University of Connecticut. Prior to that she was an associate professor at the University of Georgia and a lecturer at the

University of Illinois. She received her Ph.D. in physics from the University of Budapest and pursued special graduate studies at the Sorbonne in Paris and the University of Zurich.

Mrs. Neary has been a member of the English Department of Monroe High School for the past five years. She received her bachelor of arts degree from the College of Mount St. Vincent in 1956, and her master of arts degree in English language and literature from Fordham University in 1959.

Quinlan has been an instructor in research problems in radiation biology at the University of Rochester and an instructor in chemistry at Rochester Institute of Technology. He graduated in 1957 from St. John Fisher College and pursued his graduate studies at the University of Rochester.

FATHER GRAHAM graduated with special honors in history from the University of Toronto in 1956 and received his M.A. degree in history and S.T.B. in theology from St. Basil's Seminary this year. He was a prominent athlete as a student at Aquinas Institute and later taught in the school's history department.

Father Kelly received his B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Toronto. While there he majored in the classics and Latin. He has been a member of the faculty of Catholic Central High School in Detroit, Michigan, for the last 18 years.

Cressman has been an instructor of physics at the University of Marquette. He received his B.S. in physics from Pennsylvania State University and his Ph.D. in physics from Indiana University. He is presently an employee of the Xerox Corporation.

Rockas is presently assistant professor of English, State University College, Genesee. Prior to that he was a member of the faculties of Rochester Institute of Technology and Wayne State University and a teaching fellow at the University of Michigan. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Rochester and his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan.

Miss Peterson was a well-known instructor in languages in Rochester High Schools for many years until her retirement last year. She received her B.A. degree from Syracuse University, an M.A. in French from the University of Chicago, and an M.A. in German from the University of Rochester.

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Cayuga's United Fund Goal Set -- \$360,888

Auburn—Two Catholic charity agencies will share in the \$360,888 United Fund of Cayuga County goal, Joseph F. Cuddy, fund president, announced this week.

MERCY HOSPITAL is listed to receive \$11,300 and Catholic Family Center of Auburn, \$17,711.

Twenty-six other agencies including Boy and Girl Scout groups, a local dental clinic and five national organizations will share the balance of the record high budget total.

In the 1961 campaign the goal was \$382,388 and \$334,202 was raised. In 1960 the goal was \$310,601 and pledges totalled \$316,059. In four years this shows an increase of United Appeal goals of \$50,287.

Cuddy points out that employment in Cayuga County is up seven per cent and that general economic conditions are favorable for a fourth successful campaign. "Our big hope," he reports, "was to be able to go for substantial increases. We finally decided that this was impractical and unrealistic at this time."

Tentative approval of the goal and the agency allocations as recommended by the 125 member budget committee was voted at the July 26 United Fund meeting. United Fund representatives have held conferences with agency executives and board presidents during the past month explaining reasons for not approving full budget requests and soliciting their aid in the 40th annual campaign, Cuddy said.

General Campaign Chairman Graydon Lloyd said today that he has "high hopes" of meeting

the goal although it calls for raising \$20,000 in "new money."

Lloyd points out that in addition to the \$9,340 increase, two industries who made substantial corporate and employee pledges have discontinued their Cayuga County operations.

"A successful campaign is important to our improved business climate and to Cayuga County morale," Lloyd said. "We intend to make this four in a row. If everybody gives their fair share we'll have no problems. We have an energetic and well organized campaign team and we're all set to go," he commented.
