All students are required to present some school identification. Boys are requested to wear ties. Price is 50 cents a person.

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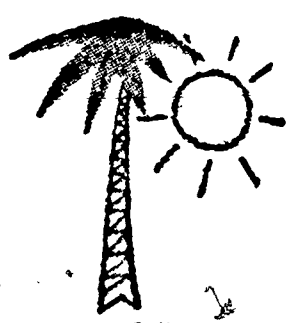
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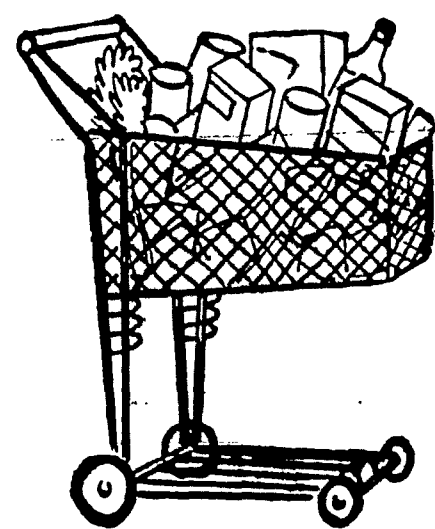
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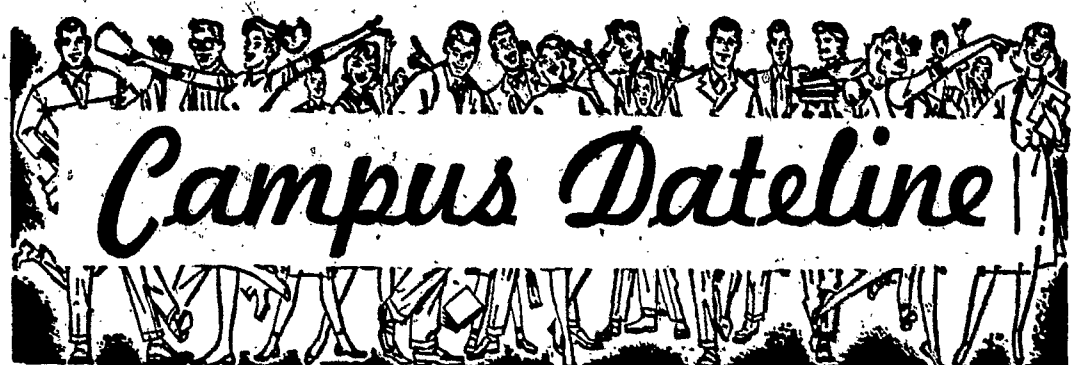
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Campus Dateline

New Faculty

The new school year at McQuaid finds 16 new faces among the administration and faculty. Eight are Jesuit priests, four are Jesuit scholastics, one a Jesuit brother, and three are laymen.

New Prefect of Discipline is Rev. Stephen J. Meany, S.J., a former Army chaplain in World War II and most recently director of youth retreats at Mount Marissa Retreat House, Staten Island, N.Y. Fr. Meany holds degrees from Fordham University and Woodstock College.

Returning to McQuaid as a religion and English teacher is Rev. Stanley E. Curtin, S.J., who was at the Rochester school from 1957 to 1961 before going to Canisius High School in Buffalo last year.

Rev. John A. St. George, S.J., who will teach Latin and English, comes to McQuaid from Loyola Seminary at Shrub Oak, N.Y. where he was Director of Communications. Earlier, Fr. St. George was chairman for four years of the Communication Arts Dept. at Fordham University.

Also teaching Latin and English will be Rev. James F. Kelly, S.J., who comes from teaching assignments at Jesuit High School, New Orleans and Canisius High School, Buffalo. Another former Canisius teacher, Rev. Francis C. Pfeiffer, S.J., who had been at the Buffalo school for fifteen years, will teach English and religion and also supervise the testing program at McQuaid.

An addition to the science faculty is Rev. William T. Suchan, S.J., who will teach physics and chemistry. Fr. Suchan holds a Master's degree from Fordham University and formerly taught at LeMoynes College.

Rev. Louis G. Mounter, S.J., who will be doing graduate work at U. of Rochester during the year, will teach French at McQuaid, and he had formerly done at Canisius and Brooklyn Prep. Teaching Latin and religion will be Rev. Robert J. Keck, S.J., whose previous teaching assignment was at a Jesuit high school in the Caroline Islands. A ninth Jesuit priest, Rev. Frank R. Haig, S.J.,

has joined the McQuaid community but will devote his time to graduate studies at U. of Rochester.

Of the new scholastics, Mr. Vincent D. Cannella, S.J., will teach geometry and physics; Mr. Vincent J. Jennings, S.J., will teach French; Mr. Edward J. McGowan, S.J., social studies; and Mr. Kevin J. Sullivan, S.J., Latin and English.

The new physical plant superintendent of the school is Brother Joseph J. Griffin, S.J.

McQuaid's physical education program will be guided by two newcomers to the lay faculty—Mr. Kenneth Jones and Mr. James Van Allen. Jones, who holds a Master's degree from Brockport State, has had experience in the West Irondequoit and Holley school systems. At McQuaid he will serve as athletic director and varsity basketball coach. Van Allen, a graduate of Cortland State, has coached previously at Whitney Point High School, N.Y. and in Michigan. He will coach junior varsity football and varsity track. The third layman, Mr. Alan Badger, will teach social studies. He holds a Bachelor's degree in education and history from St. John Fisher College.

Aquinas Debaters

The Aquinas Institute debating team or, as it is more properly known, the Aquinas Society of Forensic Arts, initiated its fourteenth season this past week with a series of practice debates on both the experienced and semi-experienced levels.

Only this year, Rev. Joseph A. O'Reilly, C.S.B. was missing from the scene. For the past fourteen years Fr. O'Reilly was director of speech and moderator of debating at the Basilian Fathers' school. He has resigned his post to give more time to his position as director of the business department of Aquinas.

Gordon DeHond and Mr. Norman Kolb, C.S.B. of the school faculty have been appointed debate coaches.

The entrance of many area schools into the field of tournament debating in the past six years has largely been due to the inspiration and leadership of Fr. O'Reilly. Moreover, the two new coaches who are taking over his forensic charges at Aquinas are his former debaters.

Plans for the present season are varied according to the new coaches. The debate topic chosen on the high school level revolves around the promotion of a common market in the Western Hemisphere and has already sparked a great deal of discussion in the after-school sessions of the society.

Supplementing the practice debates will be formal classes in the art of debating for all students interested. In addition, extensive training will be given in the various categories of oratory in preparation for winter and spring tournaments in New York State and in Canada.

According to Mr. Kolb, plans are being readied for a Saturday Debate League on the inexperienced level. This league would include McQuaid Jesuit, Bishop Kearney, Cardinal Mooney, Victor Central, Pittsford Central, Webster high schools, St. Andrews Seminary and Aquinas Institute.
