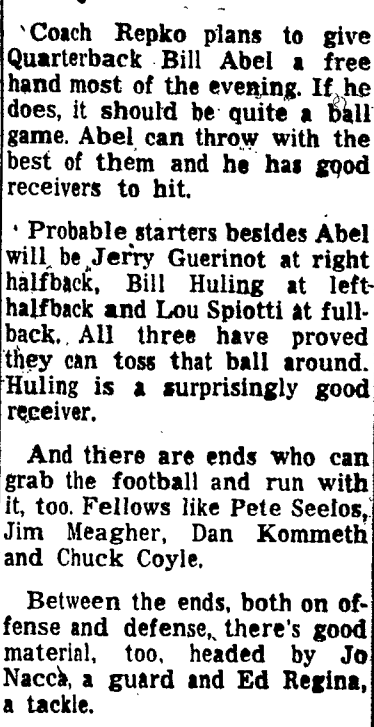

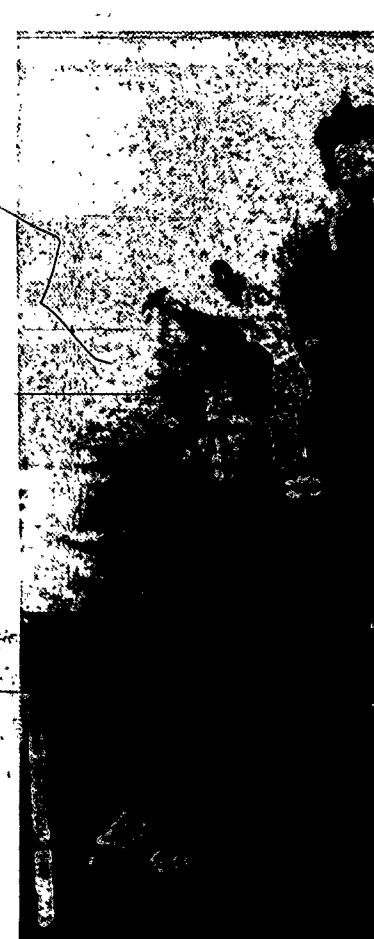

McQuaid Knights Set For Mt. Carmel High

McQuaid Jesuit High's football Knights will be out to demolish a mysterious "wharmmy" when they kick off the 1962 campaign in a 2 p.m. home game against Mt. Carmel of Auburn this Saturday at McQuaid.

Not only has McQuaid gone winless in its last three encounters with the Auburn eleven but it has also gone scoreless, tying 0-0 in 1959, losing 7-0 in 1960, and being blanked 6-0 last season. The 1962 edition has a lot of goose-eggs to atone for.

The Knights will be led into their opener by newly-selected co-captains Dick Spies and Tom Fuerst. Spies will quarterback the team, while Fuerst will hold down the left guard slot on offense, a switch from the center position he filled last season. Though Spies will also be in there on defense, the defensive signals will be called by senior linebacker Joe Hallett, giving the Knights a third field leader.

COACH TOM Seymour, in his first year as head man at McQuaid, has seen Mt. Carmel confound the Knights during his years as assistant coach and shies away from any prediction on the outcome of Saturday's clash. "They're always tough, because they're so aggressive," was Seymour's comment as he perhaps recalled the three times Mt. Carmel thwarted McQuaid inside the 10-yard line last year. He undoubtedly hopes that the 17 veterans on this year's team recall the same item.

Among those veterans will be linemen Steve Tisa, Mike Bestor, and Bob Michlewicz, the trio who'll anchor McQuaid's 5-man defensive line. Other seniors who'll be in there trying to throw a blank at the Carmelites are Hallett, Jim Pezzulo, John Foster, and Dick Dinino, all linebackers, and safetymen Spies and Dick Burns.
Juniors who have moved into the defensive set-up are Ed Hies at linebacker, Joe Miller at end, and Jim Nakas and Mike Drexel, who are battling for the other end position. If senior Tom Geen is ready, he'll likely slip in ahead of the two juniors. Pezzulo is a question mark, too, because of a nose infection.

The only casualty to date, incidentally, has been tackle Joe Moore, a 210-pound senior whose cracked knuckle will keep him out of the opener.

If the defensive unit does its job, it will still be up to Spies and Co. to win the game on offense. Spies will work with a backfield in which only left half Bill Bruckel is a solid starter. At right half, Burns and soph Mike Spiegel are neck and neck, and Pezzulo's infection puts Terry Dunlavey into the picture as a possible starting fullback.

Hallett and senior Dick Kleisley will be at the end posts, backed up by junior Terry Condon; Tisa and senior Tom
