

90 State Scholarships In Freshman Class

Ninety state scholarship winners, ten Doctors' daughters and seven girls whose last name begins with "Z" are represented in this year's freshman class at Nazareth College.

SISTER EVA MARIE, director of guidance and placement at the College, is particularly impressed with the first statistics.

"Ninety state scholarship winners out of a class of 224 approximates 40 per cent," she says. "We think that reflects the academic quality of this year's entering class."

Other statistics pointing in the same direction:

10 per cent of this year's freshmen ranked among the first three in the academic standings of their high school graduating classes. (This total includes seven class leaders, six of them from outside the Rochester area.)

56 freshmen were in the upper 10 per cent of their graduating classes.

Among other scholarship winners in this year's class are these from the Rochester area: Mary Lou Hoffman, 85 Sunflower Drive, a Nazareth Academy graduate and Elaine Tantello, 2562 Culver Road, from Mercy High School (Knights of Columbus Scholarships); Karen Sanza, 45 Norlane Drive, East Ridge High School (Dante Scholarship of the Italian Women's Civic Association); Helen Mueller, 21 Borchard St., Nazareth Academy (Catholic Daughters of America Scholarship); and Mary Waldron, 24 Hertel St., Nazareth Academy (Wegman Foundation Scholarship).

Another source of pride to Nazareth College administration is the steadily increasing number of girls who are following the footsteps of other family

members in the halls of Nazareth.

INCLUDED IN this year's class are 13 daughters of alumnae, 9 sisters of present students and 12 sisters of alumnae.

One, Mary Walsh of 96 Thatcher Road, has the distinction of being both the daughter of alumna (Anna Ryan Walsh, '31) and the sister of 1961 graduate Patricia Walsh. Four girls — Doris Fina of Saratoga; Mary Ellen Palmeri, Newark; and Patricia Selner of Endicott — are each following two sisters to Nazareth.

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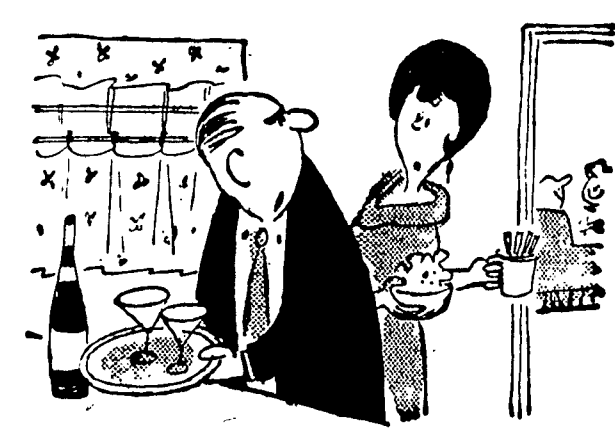
