

# Construction To Start On Hospital Annex

Contract for general construction work on two additions to St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira was awarded, Sept. 12 when bids were opened on the work estimated to cost between \$800,000 and \$1 million.

McLane Construction Co. of Elmira, low bidder was awarded the contract by the Hospital board of directors.

JOHN E. SULLIVAN, board chairman, declined to disclose the amount of the bid Wednesday night. He explained that the board is not ready to announce it because the bid was awarded only for outside construction and other bids for mechanical and electrical work are to be sought later.

He said the shell construction is expected to be completed around the first of April.

One addition will enclose the present courtyard and provide space for an enlarged laboratory and expanded offices.

The other will be a wing to connect the maternity annex with the main building. This eventually will house enlarged emergency and X-ray departments and expanded medical care facilities.

Sullivan said the McLane bid was the lowest of three bids received by the board. The other two bidders were not identified by Sullivan.

The bids were opened at the regular board meeting.

Both the courtyard addition and the connecting wing will be two-story brick structures.

Present plans call for laboratories, the business office and corridors to be completed first in the courtyard addition. A doctors' meeting room and library, a pharmacy, auxiliary rooms and medical records section will be finished later.

Only the brick outer shell and corridors will be completed in the connecting wing. A new emergency room will be constructed on the ground floor when additional funds are available.

The two additions are the third step in the hospital's long range building program. The first two steps were remodeling

the sixth floor and building the new dining rooms. X-ray department will be moved from the fifth floor to the ground floor of the connecting wing. When this move is completed, maternity will be transferred from the annex to the fifth floor.

The new first floor laboratory will be nearly twice as large as present fifth floor quarters.

Included in the new laboratory will be an isotope department, a special bacteriology department, a bacteriology department with special facilities for mycology (the study of fungus) and facilities for fluoroscopy work.

A new dietary department on the ground floor will be completed at a later date.

Harold Hirsch is architect for both additions. Local consultant is Leon Considine.

Returning members of the speech faculty are Mrs. Marian O'Neil Ide and Joseph Baranowski who will teach general speech courses and Dr. Gladys Jann and Dr. Joanne Subtelny who will continue her work in speech correction. Baranowski also serves as director of dramatics at Nazareth and St. John Fisher College.

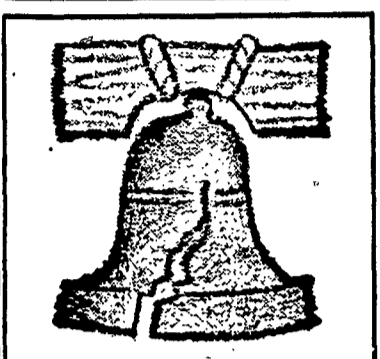
