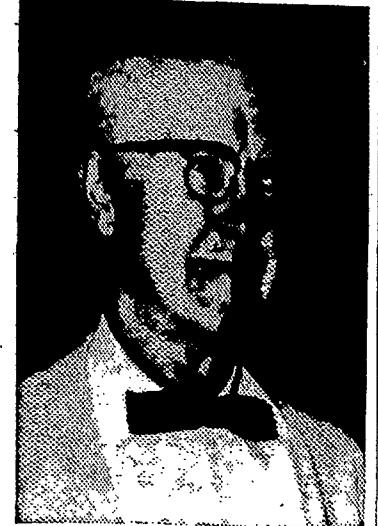


Francis Hayden Rites Held, Courier Ad Man

New Religious Program To Open In Ithaca

Beginning Saturday, Sept. 29, a new program in Religious Education for Catholic children attending public elementary schools will be inaugurated in Ithaca.

Replacing the release-time Religious Education classes which have previously been held at various times and in various places, all classes in Religious Education for Catholic children attending eight elementary schools in Ithaca and the Ithaca area will be held in Immaculate Conception School each Saturday morning.

THE SCHOOLS involved in this program are West Hill, South Hill, East Hill, Fall Creek, St. John, Central, Belle Sherman and Danby Elementary School. There will be no change in the Religious Education program for Ithaca Junior and Senior High Schools or for the Caroline and Newfield Central Schools.

On the first Saturday of the new program, Sept. 29, all Catholic children from the eight schools effected by the program change, will assemble for Mass at 9:30 a.m. in Immaculate Conception Church.

Following Mass they will go to the parochial school on Plain St. where classes will be conducted by the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart, and twelve trained lay catechists.

Classes will conclude at 11:15 a.m. when parents may pick up their children at the Plain St. entrance of the school. On succeeding Saturdays also, as on the first Saturday of the program, the hours will be from 9:30 a.m. to 11:15 a.m.
