Treadway Inn, thus becoming eligible to participate in the Miss Teen-Age America contest in Dallas, Texas with outstanding young girls from all over the country.

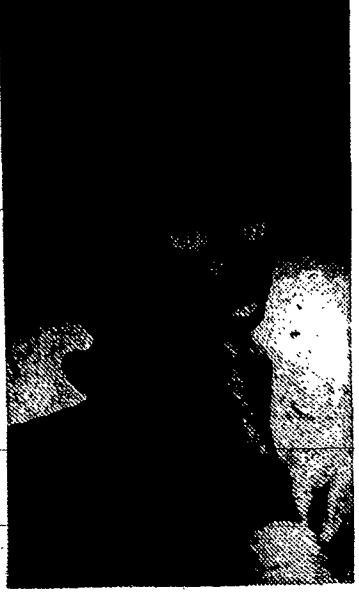

Miss Ann Culkin, well-known platform speaker, will return to Our Lady of Mercy High School, Oct. 1, for a week to conduct for Mercians her own course in personality development.

History Tour

Timon Club members will tour historic monuments in the Finger Lakes region Saturday, Sept. 29. Leaving St. Agnes High by bus at 9:30, the group will explore Canandaigua's Granger House, well-known as host to Lafayette.

The Granger House, built in 1814 when Canandaigua was the northern outpost of this area, exhibits wooden shutters as protection against Indian raids and post-Revolutionary period architecture and furnishings. Continuing to Auburn, the club will view the home of Lincoln's Secretary of State, William Seward.

Preserving Civil War period furnishings, the Seward House contains correspondence of Lincoln and Seward and furniture Seward used, including the carriage in which he was shot.

Climaxing the day, the tourists will inspect on Boughton Hill the former site of St. James' Chapel, one of the first four chapels in the Rochester area, erected by the Iroquois under Rev. Jacques Fremin, S.J., in October, 1669.

Father Fremin was the first resident pastor and three other chapels in this area from 1668-1670: St. Jean's at Lima, St. Michael's near East Bloomfield, and Immaculate Conception near Rochester Junction. These sites were marked by the late Rev. Alexander Stewart and the late Herman Hetzler.

The Timon Club, St. Agnes' History Society, was founded in 1958 to further historically-minded students' acquaintance with local history in particular. The group annually sponsors several tours to historic sites.

At McQuaid

Administrators at McQuaid Jesuit High School are anticipating a vigorous and successful academic year. Changes have been made in the areas of curriculum, guidance, discipline and extracurricular activities.

The Very Rev. Robert J. Boyle, S.J., rector of the school, recently announced that the school this year will begin to phase out its General (Terminal) Course in favor of a new college preparatory track. Incoming freshmen are now placed in one of two college preparatory sequences, the major difference being that, in one, only two years of Latin are required, in the other, four.

Placement is determined by performance in the diocesan entrance examination and by recommendation of the grade school teachers. The introduction of the new program effects a realistic adaptation to the abilities of students who would find the four-year Latin program too arduous.

The new program will provide an academic challenge to boys whose background in language arts was shown to be weak in the diocesan examination, but whose ability scores proved them capable of college preparatory work. For freshmen students of this type, the rigors of a four-year Latin program often prove a greater problem than they can comfortably cope with, especially since they have also to handle at the same time the problems of normal academic and social adjustment which entrance into high school necessarily demands.

Cautious experimentation in team teaching and programmed learning will continue this year especially in the fields of social science, English and mathematics, so stated Rev. Cornelius J. Carr, S.J., principal of the school. The fusion for class purposes of the honors and non-honors groups in certain subjects will also be scheduled for this year. This type of scheduling which enables a boy to study more in depth the subjects in which he is strongest

was initiated last year with considerable success. A by-product of this arrangement of classes is the salutary breakdown of academic caste which tended to make a boy associate only with members of his own honors or non-honors group during the school day.

Although the already full testing program given by the school will not be expanded this year, a director of testing has been appointed whose function will be to administer all standardized tests of whatever type and to interpret for the guidance counselors the results of those tests.

It will also be his function to make comparative studies of test results and to examine carefully the records of alumni sent back to the school from the college they are attending in order to determine the areas of needed improvement in the school's present curricular offerings.

A new student handbook has been issued by the school. The result of committee work during several weeks this summer, the booklet sets forth in clear terms a code of student conduct which each student is expected to follow. Some school regulations have been tightened, others relaxed.

The extracurricular program has been given a new structure with the appointment of a coordinator of extracurricular activities who is at the same time the moderator of the student council.

The council itself has been structurally reorganized, the membership cut to more effective working size, and new officers created to handle student affairs with greater efficiency and a broader distribution of responsibility.

McQuaid this year begins its preparation for the first evaluation by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. To expedite this preparation, changes have been made in departmental organization and numerous faculty committees will soon be appointed to prepare reports on all phases of the school's operations.
