New Group for School Aid

New York — (RNS) — A drive group would seek to organize to recruit 1,000,000 volunteer chapters in each of the 437 Congressional districts to wage a vigorous drive for equal aid in education. McGeary accused proponents of federal aid to education of attempting to perpetrate a "moral injustice" in advocating the exclusion of parochial schools from receiving equal assistance. 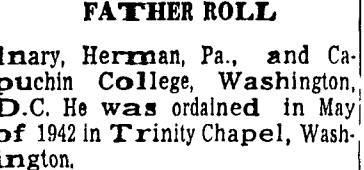

Agencies Told End Bickering In Charity Cases

Atlantic City — (RNS) — Gov. Richard J. Hughes of New Jersey sees both public and private charities playing vital and cooperative roles in today's America.

In effect, he told the 48th annual convention of the National Conference of Catholic Charities here that it doesn't matter where the money comes from to help a needy child. The important thing is to help the child.

The governor said that the "emphasis on individual initiative and self-reliance should never be misunderstood as opposition to the programs of government rightly responsive to the demands of social justice."

The governor noted that some Americans do not approve the idea of government financial support for private charitable groups. He then asked if a child being cared for by a private agency is less entitled to governmental financial assistance than a child who is being cared for by a public agency, "or indeed, not being cared for at all."

"Certainly, both in the American tradition and in the tradition of Catholic social philosophy, there is a proper role for government action, not only in encouraging the activities of private groups and enterprises, but in undertaking on its own to provide for social needs which are beyond the competence of individual citizens or their voluntary associations."

GOV. HUGHES said a public-private partnership is needed to do the job of caring for welfare cases efficiently.

"Since assuming office I have been distressed continually with the apparent lack of adequate state revenues in the face of proper legislative demands by the people of New Jersey," he said.

With the state's responsibility to every child in need of care, he added, "there is the practical question of the just allocation of the state's existing revenues, and quite possibly a necessary search for new sources of revenue."

"Those who flinch at present or prospective financial costs must be reminded of the reality of future social costs. To the extent we fail to deal with the child in need today, we store up new problems for the years ahead, tragic, costly ones."
