Hornell Home Foe For McQuaid Eleven

With a mildly explosive 33-13 victory over Mt. Carmel of Auburn to show for last weekend's activity, McQuaid Jesuit High faces what looms as a stiff test in a 2 p.m. home game against Hornell this Saturday.

THE INVADERS, who tied McQuaid, 13-13 last year, were impressive victors in their own opener, scoring three times in passes and once on a punt return. Their high-powered offense figures to severely test a McQuaid defense that was none too impressive against Mt. Carmel.

Prospects are for a free-wheeling game that will likely attract an SRO crowd to the Jesuits' gridiron on Elmwood Ave.

McQuaid's defensive picture can look for some bolstering this weekend with the return of linebacker Jim Pezullo, whose nose infection kept him out of uniform against Mt. Carmel. And Eddie Iles, who sustained a hand injury in the opening minutes of the Carmel game, will also be ready for linebacking duty. That was the area in which the Knights were hurting as Mt. Carmel rolled on the ground for 20 touchdowns to narrow the score to 20-13 midway through the third period. The same weakness against Hornell's deceptive attack could prove costly.

Against Mt. Carmel, however, the offense took a lot of the pressure off, and sophomore Mike Spiegel contributed a 98-yard run with an intercepted pass as McQuaid topped its point output against the visitors for any of the previous five games in the series. Quarterback Dick Spies, who also chipped in with a vital block of Carmel's notable PAT attempt) did a notable job of directing the Knights' scoring thrusts, completing 4 of 4 passes for 128 yards, averaging over 10 yards per carry on the 10 times he kept the ball, and breaking into the scoring column with a short plunge in the fourth quarter as well as a conversion run in the first.

In all, it was a standout performance for the senior from Brighton. (He also was named this week as one of McQuaid's five semi-finalists in the National Merit competition.)

The Knights, after going scoreless in three previous Mt. Carmel clashes, surged to a 20-0 lead in the first two periods. Two plays after the opening kickoff, Spies hit halfback Bill Bruckel with a pass down the middle and Bruckel, the school's quarter-mile record-holder, angled for the sidelines and went 68 yards for the score.

Next time in possession, McQuaid rolled 80 yards, with Spies running well and halfback Dick Burns cutting off left end for 29 yards and the

Fallon High Set To Meet Aquinas

An experienced Aquinas Institute team thundered past Corning Free Academy, 20-7, at Aquinas Memorial Stadium last Friday evening to open its football season on a victory note. "I'm always satisfied with a win but we've got to improve," Coach Joe Repko said.

His Little Irish stalwarts were whooping it up in the dressing room, fresh off the field from a decisive win over Corning, always a potential threat. Repko already was looking ahead to the powerhouses that make up the second half of his schedule.

"We made a lot of mistakes we can't afford when we meet teams like Cleveland and Pittsburgh," he continued. "If we do, we'll end up on the short end of the score." Aquinas had a pass intercepted, lost a fumble and was penalized 150 yards.

Repko took time to reflect on the game just played — the season's opener for both clubs. He called it a "team effort," in giving credit for the win while singling out fullback Lou Spiotti, halfbacks Jerry Guerinot and Bill Huling for special mention, along with the passing of quarterback Bill Able and a rugged, impenetrable line.

ABEL SET UP the first Irish touchdown by hitting Pete Seelos who scored from the one yard line. Helmut Reimann kicked the extra point to put the Maroon and White in front at the end of the first quarter.

Pierre Baker of Corning caught a 34 yard pass from John Driggins to make the lone touchdown for the Downstater. Thomas evaded the score by running the ball.

Aquinas tallied touchdown number two just seconds before the half on a quarterback sneak by Bill Abel. The kick failed.

With seconds remaining in the game, the Irish scored its third touchdown. Abel passed to Van Cardilli who sprung Jerry Guerinot for the ball loose to cover 32 yards. End over and Reimann kicked the final point.

NEXT SUNDAY Aquinas will shoot for its second victory of the season when it entertains Bishop Fallon High School of Buffalo in a 2 o'clock game.

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NEA Blamed House Scuttles College Aid Bill

Washington — (NC) — The compromise bill to aid American colleges was sidetracked by the House after a howling controversy in which the nation's biggest educational association openly attacked equal federal assistance to private colleges.

Most immediate Congressional opinion was that the bill is dead. But Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, chairman of the Senate Education subcommittee, said he would try to rescue it nevertheless.

The National Education Association, climaxing a gradual buildup in its active opposition, sent telegrams to all members of Congress just before the house vote, demanding that the bill not be adopted.

William G. Carr, executive director of the association, said the bill's provision for "special purpose" grants to all colleges, including those which are private, imperiled constitutional separation of Church and State. He made no objections on educational grounds.

After the House voted 214 to 168 to send the bill back to House-Senate conference, a course urged by the NEA, Msgr. Frederick G. Hochwalt, a top spokesman for Catholic education, blasted the NEA's inter-

Ohio Food Stores Seek Sunday Shopping OK

Columbus — (NC) — The Ohio Catholic Welfare Conference has denounced efforts to relax state Sunday closing laws.

In a statement issued (Sept. 21) by Msgr. Francis J. Carney, chairman of its Social Action Section, the conference charged that the proposal to change existing statutes here is an "emotionally charged campaign conducted by particular interest groups for economic advantage."

Ohio residents will vote in a statewide referendum this fall on an amendment to present laws which would permit the Sunday sale of "milk, milk products, any food item or food product for human or animal consumption."

Petitions seeking the vote were filed by the Lawson Milk Company of Cuyahoga Falls.

The Catholic conference's statement, which was signed by each of Ohio's six dioceses, said that should it "become necessary that a change be made in the existing laws, it should be done by the prudent action of the Legislature."

It said that Americans are a religious people who "would deplore any change in the present laws which would be conducive to the secularization of Sunday by making it a day of business as usual."

Abbey Marks Fifty Years

St. Benoit Du Lac — (RNS) — Governor General Georges Vanier, the Queen's representative in Canada, received a warm welcome on a visit to the Benedictine Abbey here in connection with the monastery's 50th anniversary.

Also received by the Catholic monks were ambassadors of 16 nations and clergy of several denominations.

Bishop's Rite On Sweden TV

Stockholm — (NC) — The first consecration of a Catholic bishop in Sweden since the Reformation was brought into thousands of Swedish homes by radio and television.

The consecration of Bishop John E. Taylor, O.M.I. of Stockholm, a native of East St. Louis, Ill., took place (Sept. 21) in the Blue Hall of Stockholm's City Hall because the cathedral here was too small to accommodate the 2,000 persons attending the historic event.

The consecration was followed by a reception for the new Bishop at the U.S. embassy.
