

# Harold Nichols Rites, Veteran News Editor

Solemn Funeral Mass for Harold A. Nichols, radio and television editor of the Democrat and Chronicle and one time Clyde correspondent for the Catholic Courier Journal was offered in St. Augustine's Church, Friday, September 28.

Mr. Nichols, 57, of 69 Somerset St., died unexpectedly, Sept. 24, 1962, in his home.

Mr. Nichols was educated at St. John the Evangelist School, Clyde, and Clyde High School. Acknowledged as "an all around" reporter, Mr. Nichols had covered virtually every type of news during his career.

He started on the Clyde Herald, a weekly in his native town. He would cover a story and return to the plant and set it directly on a linotype machine instead of composing it first on the typewriter. During this period he sent many interesting items of Catholic news into the diocesan newspaper here.

After 10 years on the Herald, Mr. Nichols became Penn Yan and Yates County correspondent for the Times Union and Democrat and Chronicle. He joined the regular staff of the D&C, Feb. 15, 1937.

With Herb Schaeffer, D&C photographer, Mr. Nichols co-authored an aviation column and at the time of his death wrote a Sunday television column.

During World War II, Mr. Nichols wrote the "Dear Buddy Letter," a newspaper feature mailed by the Rochester Convention and Publicity Bureau to Monroe County servicemen all over the world. He was given the convention Bureau's award in 1949.

He is survived by his wife, Josephine; one sister, Miss Gertrude Nichols; one brother, John R. Nichols, both of Newark, N.Y.

## Priest-Brother Offers John McMillen Mass

Funeral Mass for John E. McMillen, director of industrial relations at Kodak Park Works of Eastman Kodak Co. was celebrated by his brother, the Rev. Gertrude McMillen, O.F.M., of Tampa, Fla., in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Tuesday, Oct. 2.

Mr. McMillen, 53, of 128 Seneca Parkway died suddenly, Friday, Sept. 28, 1962.

Among priests at the Requiem Mass were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John M. Duffy and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay.

Born in Rochester, Mr. McMillen was a 1926 graduate of Aquinas Institute where he captained the basketball team and starred at the game with his brother, Father McMillen. He also played basketball at St. Bonaventure College where he received his bachelor degree in 1932.

Active in the Sacred Heart Cathedral Men's Club, Mr. McMillen headed up the recent parish campaign for the two new high schools.

After employment in the auditing division of the City of Rochester he went to Kodak in 1937. He was transferred to the employment department in 1940 and after working in the film emulsion division and the auditing division and export building, he became head of the employment department in 1949.

Among groups in which he was active were Rochester Rehabilitation Council, Rochester Mental Health Association, Rochester Industrial Management Council and Rochester Chamber of Commerce.

AT KODAK he served as a board member of Kodak Park Athletic Association, was a director of Kodak Employees' Association, a member of the Pioneer Club and of the executive committee of Eastman Savings and Loan Association.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Margaret Oberst McMillen; a daughter, Sharon; two sons, John E. Jr. and Kevin B.; his mother, Mrs. Charles McMillen; two sisters, Mrs. John F. Judge and Mrs. James J. Goodwin.

## Dr. DeSando Funeral Held In Cathedral

Requiem Mass for Dr. Carl DeSando was offered by Rev. Francis J. Taylor in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Tuesday, Oct. 2. Dr. DeSando, 49 of 240 Edgemere Drive, Greece died Sept. 28, 1962 in St. Mary's Hospital.

He was a graduate of Aquinas Institute, Niagara University with a bachelor of science degree in 1934 and in 1938 from Georgetown University School of Medicine.

DR. DESANDO, a general practitioner from 1941 until 1959 had offices at 1095 and 2099 Ridge Road West, Greece.

He served on the staff of St. Mary's Hospital from 1941 until 1959 and at General Hospital from 1942 until 1955. He was with the Army Medical Corps in World War II in France and Germany from 1944 until 1946.

While at St. Mary's, Dr. DeSando was treasurer of the medical staff and chairman of general practitioners.

He served as a trustee in the Knights of Columbus in 1954. He belonged to School Health Association, Greece; Rochester Academy of Medicine; New York State Medical Association of General Practitioners, Monroe County Medical Society and Rochester Pathological Society.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Marie Notebaert DeSando; two daughters, Mrs. Marie McFarlin and Miss Teresa DeSando; two sons, Carl Jr. and John A.; his mother Mrs. Mary DeSando; a brother Joseph; one grandson and several nieces and nephews.

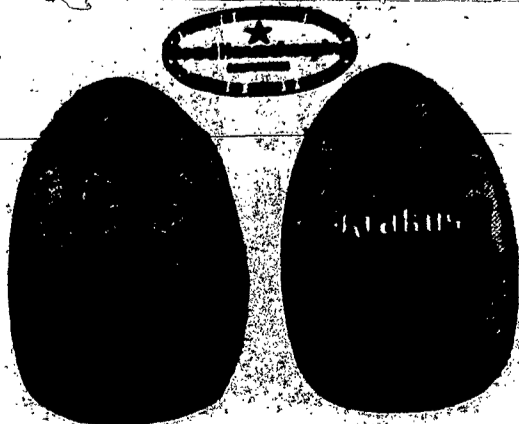

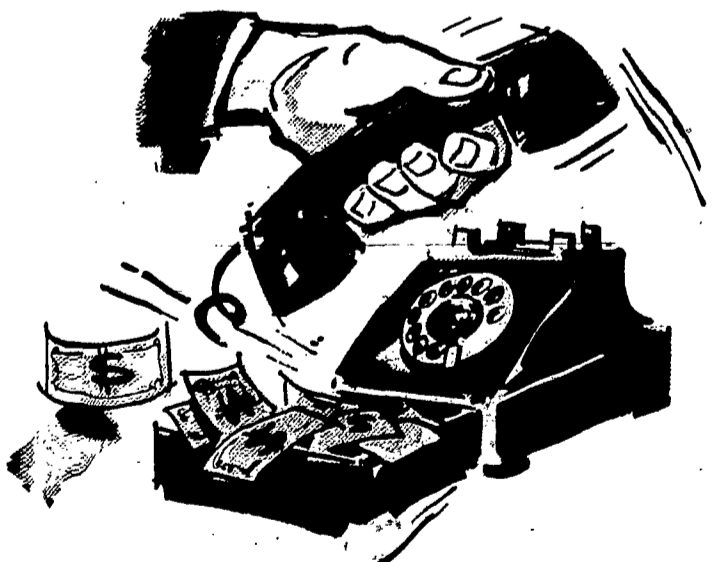
