## Top Honor

Mercy's paper, the Quill, has received the top honor "Publication of Distinction"; both the QUILL and MERCEDES, literary magazine, are the recipients for another year of the All-Catholic award; and a Mercy senior, Kathy Ashenburg, and two graduates ('62), Cheryl Greene and Barbara Sidoti, have won individual honorable mentions for their writings. The awards are given by the Catholic School Press Association of Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Under the editorship of graduates Elaine Tantillo and Carol Weidenborner, the QUILL merited the All-Catholic rating, the highest award given by the association, by reaping a total of 805 points out of a possible 1000.

The QUILL was also noted by the Association as a "Publication of Distinction," and rated excellent in the following areas: diffusion of Catholic thought; promotion of Catholic activity; editorial content; news; editorials and features; physical appearance; typography, layout and design; uniform and consistent style; headline construction and accuracy; and application of art to news and features.

The MERCEDES, rated excellent in the fields of service to the school and student body, typography, makeup and artwork, was edited by graduates Gail Kinsky and Jan de Young.

Honorable mention in the individual writing contests conducted by the CSPA went to Kathy Ashenburg for her short story in the January '62 MERCEDES, "Olives Are For Courage"; to Cheryl Greene for her news story on "Mercians To Participate in Inter-High Conference"; and to Barbara Sidoti for her feature, "Image of Youth."

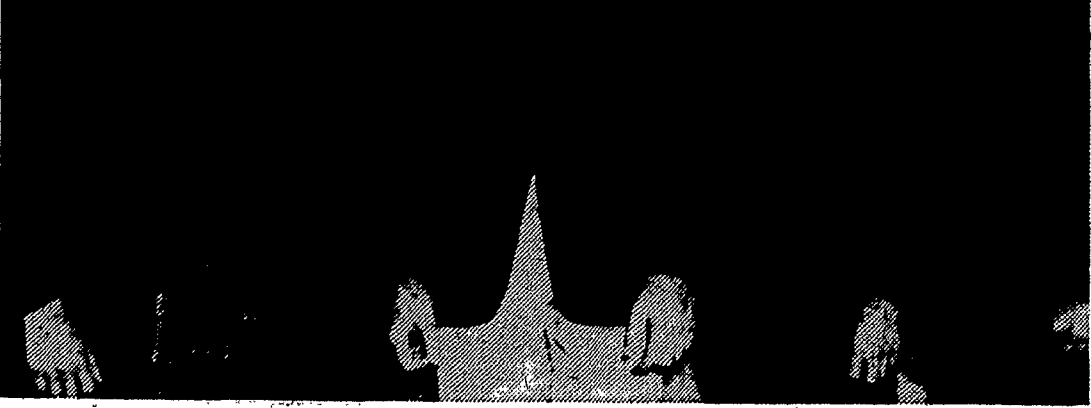

## Formosa Bishop

Bishop Thomas Niu of Yangku, Formosa, on his way to the Ecumenical Council in Rome, unexpectedly visited St. Agnes High School, Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 26. The Apostolic Administrator of Chiayi is hoping to add a new girls' wing to his Sacred Hearts (sic) boys' school and Seminary, and appeared to observe a typical American Catholic girls' high school.

An appeal for aid to St. Agnes' unit of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade in February, 1961, to build the school-seminary already had mutually acquainted the bishop and the Rochester school. According to its function, the unit responded, and His Excellency has responded with mission leaders here since then, expressing the needs of the projected and completed school.

In March this year, for example, he reiterated the need for native priests. While the seminary, added in 1961 with the help of mission alms, now accommodates boys with priestly vocations, there are still but two native priests in the entire Chiayi Diocese which has nearly 13,000 Catholics. In his most recent letter, His Excellency begged the girls' support for a new dormitory to house one hundred more boys.

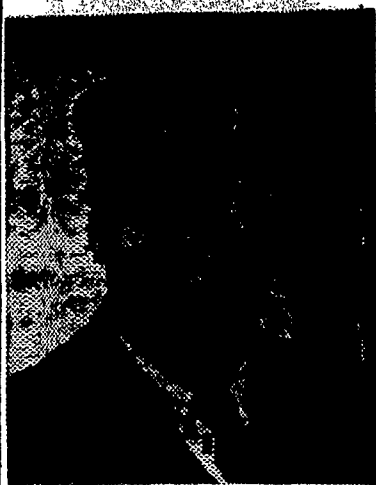
## Buffalo Lawyer Scheduled By Bath Knights
