**McQuaid '11' Faces Olean**

McQuaid Jesuit High will be out to even the score against one of the two teams to defeat it last year when it meets Bishop Walsh High School of Olean at McQuaid field, this Saturday afternoon.

The Knights come up to the game with a 2-0 record, thanks to last Saturday's mud-splattered 13-7 win over a formidable Hornell eleven. Walsh, which has a home date with Aquinas in November, is 1 and 1, its win coming by a 21-0 count last week. The eagles have good size this year and their largely veteran cast includes quarterback Greg Dallas, fullback Jim Yehl, and halfback John Considine, all of whom played prominent roles in last year's 20-7 Walsh victory over a bigger McQuaid team. Dallas in particular, at 6-1 and 190 pounds, will be an all-around threat from his signal-calling post.

LONE CASUALTY in the McQuaid lineup for the game will be halfback Dick Burns, whose chronic knee injury also kept him sidelined against Hornell. Back in action, however, will be...

The Hornell contest was a tight one all the way. The Knights spotted their opponents an early touchdown following a fumble on the McQuaid 27. Then they dug in to keep the offensive-minded visitors scoreless while the McQuaid attack forged the two touchdowns it needed. The first one was not long in coming, with quarterback Dick Spies directing an 80-yard drive that tied the score before the end of the opening period.

Halfback Bill Bruckel, an outstanding two-way performer for the Knights, did the heavy gaining as McQuaid moved past mid-field, and then Ralph Camardo, playing at the other halfback spot, broke loose outside for a 45-yard sprint to the Hornell 3. Camardo, who has received doctor's permission to play following re-examination for a suspected heart murmur, was making his first carry of the season on that breakaway.

The teams battled on even terms after that. McQuaid being felled once inside the Hornell 10, and Hornell being bogged down by fumbles and a Bruckel interception. Opportunity finally knocked too loudly to be resisted when McQuaid line-backer Jim Pezullo snared a Hornell fumble on the visitors' 22 late in the third period. Five plays later, fullback Terry Dunlavey went three yards for the winning score.

Hornell was far from through, though, and its fine quarterback, Frank Wyant, kept the crowd on edge with his passing and running in an action-packed final quarter.
