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GOD LOVE YOU!

If we sat down to table with a Communist, the editor of an anti-Catholic magazine, a wealthy non-religious man and woman, union leaders and a so-called Christian, would anyone at the table know that we believed in the Divinity of Christ and His Church, had our lips purpled by the Precious Blood of the Saviour and participated in the Divine Nature? In other words, would we be "separated" from the rest in our sense of values, our judgments about life, birth, education, suffering and death?

And yet we have been told: "Separate yourselves from them and I will make you welcome." The separation is not physical, but spiritual; not social, but moral. The Jews were never permitted to use an ox and an ass at the same plow, for one was a clean animal and the other was unclean. St. Paul, continuing the idea, said we were not to be "unequally yoked" with the pagans: "You must live as men native to the Light; when the Light has its effect, all its goodness and holiness and truth; your lives must be a manifestation of God's will."

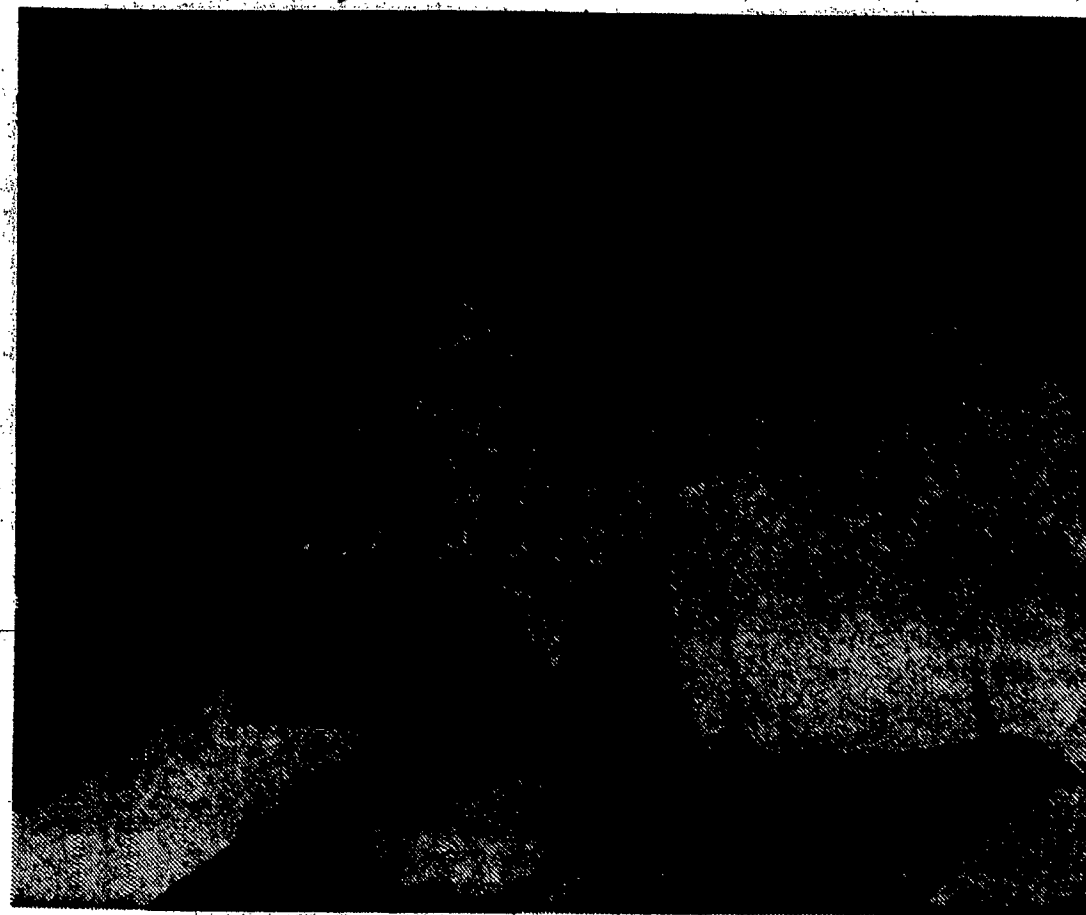
In this matter, most of us have failed. In fact, there is often much less zeal for spreading the Truth among the Children of Light than there is zeal for spreading Communism among the children of darkness. The latter talk Communism and are unafraid to do so; we often shrink from announcing our Faith. A Catholic lawyer in Berlin had a non-Catholic partner for twenty years. When the non-Catholic lay dying, his Catholic partner said: "Now that you are dying, why not embrace the Faith?" His partner answered: "If your Faith means so little to you that you never spoke of it during our long relationship, then it should mean little at death!"

Our sterility, if there be any; our practice of Faith control, if there be any; our failure to beget spiritual children in Christ, is serious. If you have never recovered a lost sheep or made a convert or healed a leper, it might be well to begin doing it. Since you have not yet succeeded, name a proxy. Have the Holy Father send a missionary to Africa or Asia. If you cannot afford this, send a catechist or someone who will instruct others in the family. This amounts to only \$20 a month. If you cannot make that sacrifice, any many cannot, then save a penny a day and at the end of three months send the dollar to the Holy Father through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Geneva—Funeral services for Danny Chacchia Sr., 81, retired realty and insurance businessman, were held Monday, Sept. 24, in St. Francis de Sales Church.

He was a successful businessman starting his career as a worker in industry with the railroads, Phillips and Clark Stone Works and the Singer Sewing Machine Company. He then started his own business of real estate and insurance which he operated for 25 years.

For 18 years he acted as court interpreter for all members of his nationality who came to city hall and city court.

When he retired from the real estate and insurance bus-

ness he saw it continued by his younger son, S. Danny Chacchia, and his daughter, Miss Edith Chacchia. His older son, M. Maurice Chacchia, a widely known Geneva attorney, is currently Ontario County District Attorney.

Mr. Chacchia was a past vice president of the Geneva Real Estate Board. He had lived all his life in Geneva after coming to this country.

He is survived by his two sons and four daughters, Mrs. Armando Felicetti, Mrs. Anthony Quartaro, Mrs. Joseph Crupi and Miss Edith Chacchia, all of Geneva; 11 grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; a step-brother, Salvatore, of Toronto, Canada; and a step-sister, Mrs. Ralph Savarese, of Brooklyn.

Mission Doctor Set By K. of St. J. Auxiliary

The Ladies District Auxiliary No. 1, Knights of St. John will hold their quarterly meeting at the Powers Hotel on Friday evening, Oct. 26. Dr. Paul S. Lalonde will be present to tell of his work in Africa.

At the Mission Scenaram in the Community War Memorial several years ago, Dr. Lalonde met one of the Sisters of the Medical Missionaries of Mary stationed in Tanganyika and was invited to visit the Hospital when on his planned hunting trip to Africa.

A day of rain prompted him to travel 50 miles by jeep to visit the hospital in Ndoroda. He spent the remainder of his trip at the hospital where he taught the Sisters how to inject anesthetic and extract teeth. His first day of dentistry in Africa was practiced on a camp stool. He was greatly impressed by the work being done by the Sisters and promised to return the following year with equipment.

Now he has a well equipped dental office, complete with X-ray machine, and has opened additional clinics in Angola, Nigeria and the Motherhouse in Drogheda, north of Dublin, Ireland.

Dr. Lalonde is a volunteer lay associate of the Medical Missionaries of Mary. He receives no pay, travels at his own expense and furnishes his own equipment.
