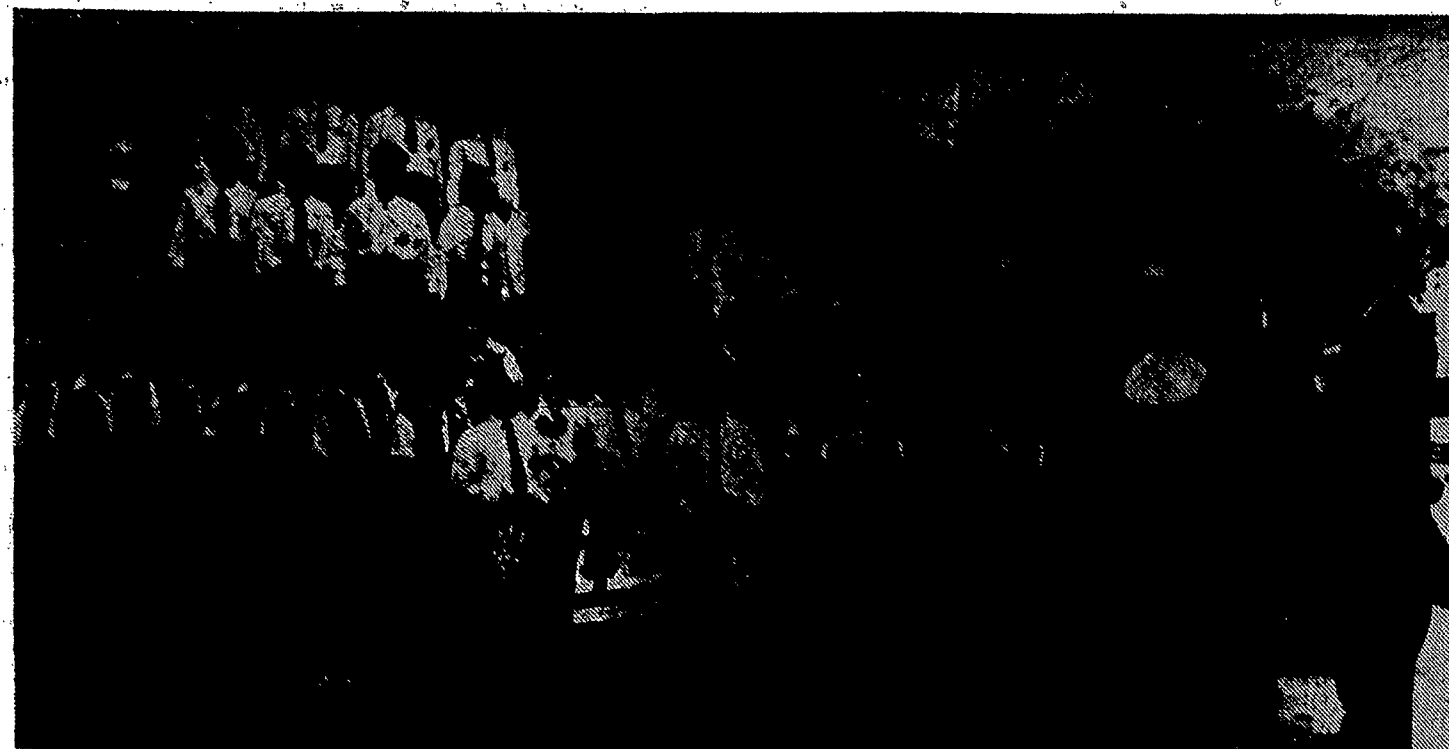

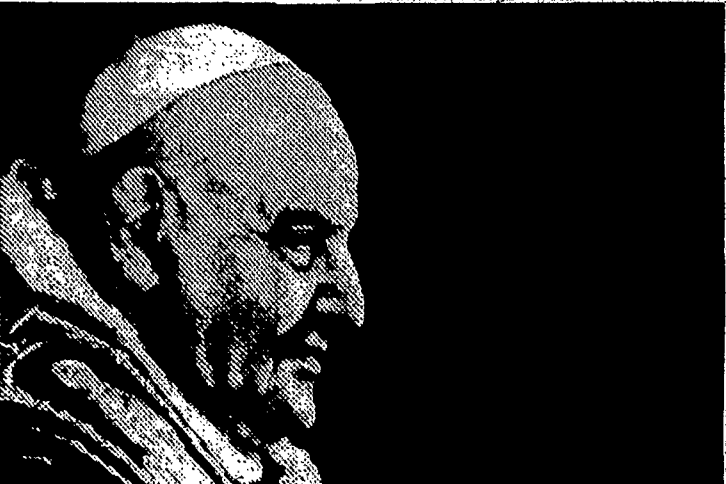
## Original TV Drama Set Sunday

An original television drama by a Jesuit theologian-poet will be presented by the "Catholic Hour" on the NBC-TV Network Sunday, Oct. 14, 1:30 - 2 p.m.

The author is the Rev. Daniel Berrigan, S.J., assistant professor of theology at Le Moyne College, Syracuse. He has based his TV prose play, "Hope," on the life of the Rev. Rupert Mayer, S.J., a German priest who was imprisoned in a Nazi concentration camp and died in Munich in 1945. It will be the first in a cycle of three original TV dramas to be broadcast by the "Catholic Hour" in October. Conrad Nagel will portray Father Mayer in "Hope."
