Knights - Jamestown To Meet Saturday

McQuaid's football Knights will go to Jamestown, New York, on Saturday night for a clash with Jamestown High School. For both schools it will be a "bounce back" game, McQuaid having suffered its first loss of the season, 13-0, to Archbishop Walsh of Olean last Saturday and the Jamestown club having taken it on the chin from Aquinas Institute of Rochester, 43-0.

It will be the Knight's first road contest after three home games, and a good-sized student entourage will likely accompany them. One thing those fans will be looking for is a resurgence of the McQuaid offense, almost completely shackled last week by a fast, veteran Walsh eleven.

Playing for the second straight week on a muddy gridiron, the Knights had their mobility further hampered by quarterback Dick Spies' sprained ankle and the sub-par condition of halfback Bill Bruckel. Without the usual output from that duo, McQuaid was able to mount only one serious threat. On the other hand, its defense, though performing to coach Tom Seymour's satisfaction, could not contain the Eagles when defensive breaks forced by the visitors gave them scoring opportunities deep in McQuaid territory.

To score its two touchdowns, Walsh had only to negotiate 22 yards. It did, and convincingly.

The first Walsh score stemmed from a deflected McQuaid pass that Eagle halfback John Considine picked off and carried 29 yards to the McQuaid 5. Fullback Jim Yehl bulled over from 1 yard out, putting the Knights behind to stay.

Coming as it did in the first period, that score didn't seem to loom too large with McQuaid totting a 3-touchdown average. But the closest the Knights could come to paydirt in the opening half was a punt return by Ralph Camardo on which a probable score was aborted by an official's ruling that Camardo's knee had touched the ground as he got underway.

Trailing, 6-0, McQuaid appeared on the verge of at least tying the count in the third period when a fumble recovery gave it a start on Walsh's 35.

Camardo carried for one first down, and Spies, on his only effective move of the game, boollagged around right end to the 6. But when he elected to go to the air on the first play from there, Walsh's line showed its prowess by throwing him for a sizeable loss.

They did an encore two plays later and the threat died back on the 25 Walsh then launched its best drive of the game to pin McQuaid deep into its own territory. Though a fumble halted the Eagles, they got the ball back again on McQuaid's 17 when Spies was hit while trying to pass.

Once again the Eagles had their short scoring punch, and five plays later quarterback Greg Dallas got the six points on a 1-yard buck. Walsh end Tony Mikolajczak, thorn in McQuaid's side all day, booted the final point.

This week, Spies should be ready, barring an aggravation to his ankle, and defensive men George Vito and Tom Brennan, along with halfback Mike Spiegel, should also be recovered from assorted ailments. The combination of a dry field and a desire to get back on the winning track could bring a decided about-face at Jamestown. Enough to make the trip worthwhile, at any rate.
