Caution Advised On Unity Hope

Vatican City — (RNS) — Expressing "great pleasure" at the growth of friendly contacts between the Roman Catholic Church and other Christian Churches

over the past two years, Augustin Cardinal Bea, president of the Vatican Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, warned here that the world should not "overestimate" or "underestimate" the results.

Writing in a special issue of Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily, Cardinal Bea said these contacts had "greatly improved the atmosphere between Catholics and Non-Catholic Christians." He pointed to such developments as the visit to Pope John XXIII by the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Geoffrey Francis Fisher; Dr. Archibald Craig, moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, and others.

THE CARDINAL also cited the appointment of Vatican observers to the Third Assembly of the World Council of Churches in New Delhi; the decision of the WCC to send delegate-observers to the Second Vatican Council; and the presence of delegate-observers from non-Roman Churches at the current Ecumenical Council.

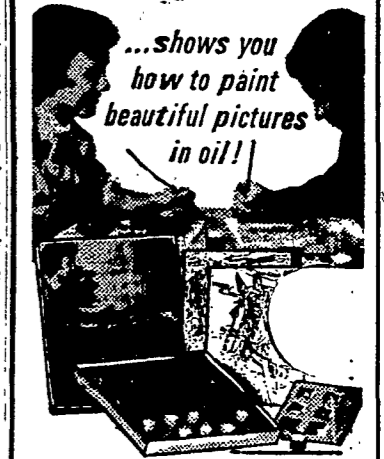
However, he said, "it would be a mistake to over- or underestimate these things."

The German-born Jesuit cautioned against overvaluing them by forgetting "the great differences, especially doctrinal, which exist."

It is also an error to undervalue them, he continued, "by saying that because the differences remain, these visits and contacts have no use."

Prejudice Said National III

New York — (NC) — A Catholic editor honored for his contribution to better understanding between Christians and Jews said here that "prejudice in all its manifestations" is one of the greatest problems in the U.S.

Gerard E. Sherry, managing editor of the Central California Register, newspaper of the Monterey-Fresno, Calif., diocese, said this prejudice is present in commerce, labor, management, housing, politics and even in the religious press.

Sherry, honored with the 1962 award of the Edith Stein Guild (Oct. 13), said that "the anti-Catholic utterances of some Protestant publications give one a sense of frustration rather than anger."

"ONE WONDERS," he added, "whether the misinformation passed around is wittingly or unwittingly spread."

Sherry said that "our own Catholic press cannot escape the accusing finger" either. "Some of us act not only in a prejudiced or biased manner against others, but we also practice this deceptive art on our coreligionists."

"There are also many so-called pamphlets published by some groups of Catholics which are pure and unadulterated epistles of hate under the guise of religion," he continued.

Founder Dies at 84

Midland — (NC) — Father John Milway Fillion, S.J., founder of the Canadian Martyrs shrine near here, died at the shrine (Oct. 10) at the age of 84.

The shrine, dedicated to the memory of eight missionary martyrs in the area where five of these Jesuits died at the hands of the Indians early in the 17th century. It is visited each year by thousands of pilgrims from Canada and all parts of the world.

Born at Gréville, Que., Father Fillion entered the Jesuit order in Montreal in 1900 and was ordained to the priesthood in 1915. Between 1924 and 1928 he was provincial of the newly formed Upper Canada Province of the Jesuits.

"Their thesis is clearly opposed to Church teaching. So, too, some of our Catholic weekly newspapers practice this prejudice bordering on bigotry."

Sherry stated that the "justifiable stand" of the Catholic press is "toward God and away from the doctrines of the humanists and secularists."

"However," he added, "when it's a question of Catholic publishers or Catholic editors deliberately depriving their readers of permissible views simply because they personally disagree with them, then I say this is prejudice bordering on bigotry."

Capuchin To UN Post

Yonkers — (NC) — Father Hugh Morley, O.F.M. Cap., has resigned as editor of View magazine to become permanent representative of the International Union of the Catholic Press to the United Nations.

The Capuchin, who founded View, is a veteran of 25 years in Catholic press work. He served from 1954 until 1962 as a member of the board of directors of the Catholic Press Association and was the association's treasurer from 1958 until 1960.

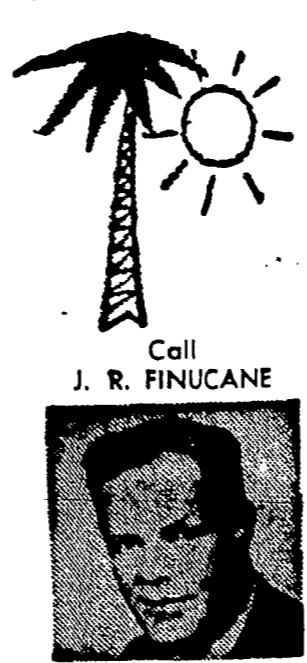
Father Morley was appointed to the UN post by the president of the press union, Ramonondo Manzini, editor of Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily newspaper.
