Corning — Area Catholic students, presently in their senior year of high school and intending to continue their education in a Catholic college or university, were reminded today that they have until Dec. 1 to file for a State Knights of Columbus Scholarship.

RAYMOND OLDER, chairman of the Corning Council's scholarship committee, said 36 scholarships with a total value of \$36,000 will be available to New York State Catholic youths this year.

Those seeking the benefit of such scholarships, but residing outside of New York State may still apply, provided they have a brother or father, who is a member of a K of C council of New York State.

STOP THE WORLD

STOP THE WORLD — I WANT TO GET OFF—No one in the show is over thirty-one and they were nearly two years younger when it first opened in England. With the help of Leslie Briscusse, a leading song writer, who was chosen by Beatrice Lillie as her leading man while still an undergraduate, the whole musical-book, lyrics, music,—was composed, directed, mixed, sung, acted by Anthony Newley who began his theatrical career at fourteen.

His leading lady, Anna Quayle, stepped on the stage at three and is now twenty-six; the charming Baker twins began as child models and are veteran actresses at seventeen; all the nine pretty girls of the chorus are under twenty. It's too bad the ideas aren't as fresh and buoyant as the actors.

THE THEME is the Seven Ages of Man, the scene, half the arena of a one-ring circus and everyone wears tights except Mr. Newley who appears in the baggy trousers and white face of the conventional clown and composes himself as a combination Marcel Marceau and Chaplain.

From a baby who makes mumbly noises, Mr. Newley's Littlecap starts out a sordid but successful career with his boss's daughter which leads to continental business and encounters with international charms, all impersonated by Miss Anna Quayle, an Amazonian beauty, whose first song, "I'm a Typical English Girl" is repeated as a Russian, German and American.

Although condemned to wear a grey sweat shirt and grey pants with her eyes made up in banalish fashion, Miss Quayle is a triumphant comedienne. Mr. Newley has forgotten the pathos that is the aura of Chaplin and Marceau. He is always the brash young man even when he is the "fall guy" which in British vernacular is "I've been lumbered but" sings he, "I'll never be lumbered again."
