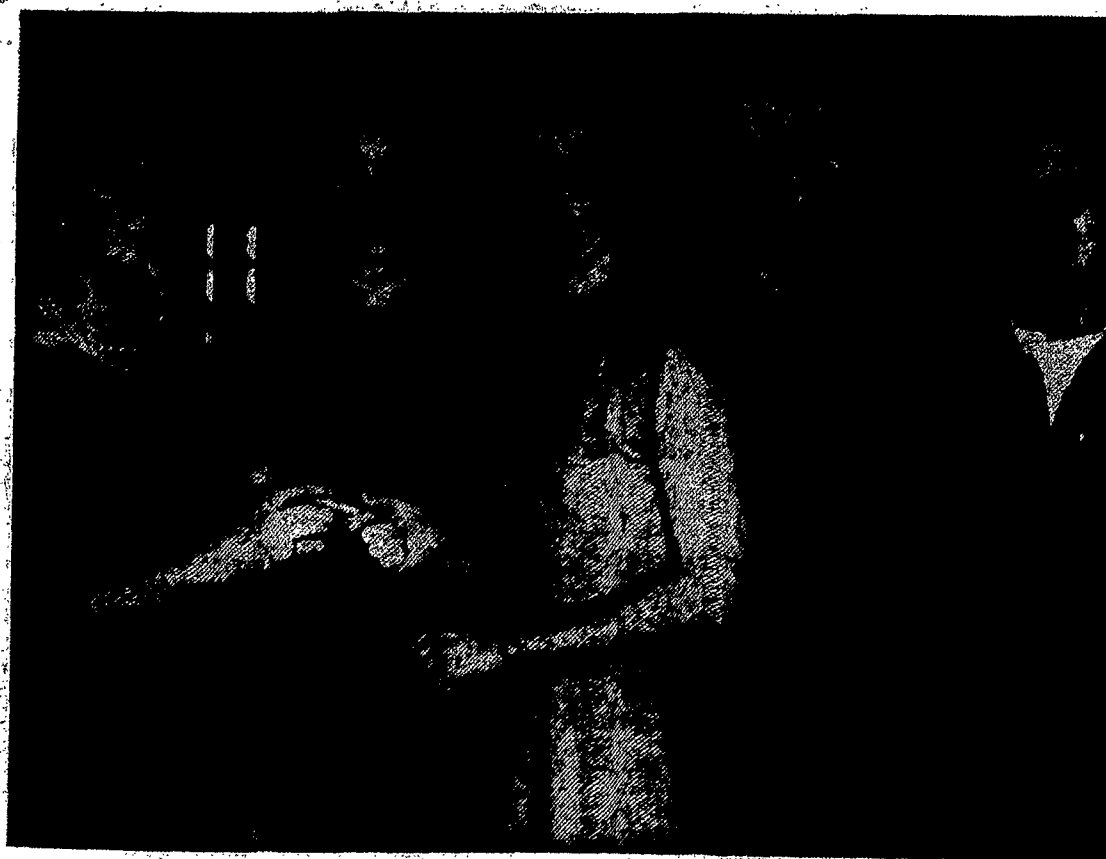

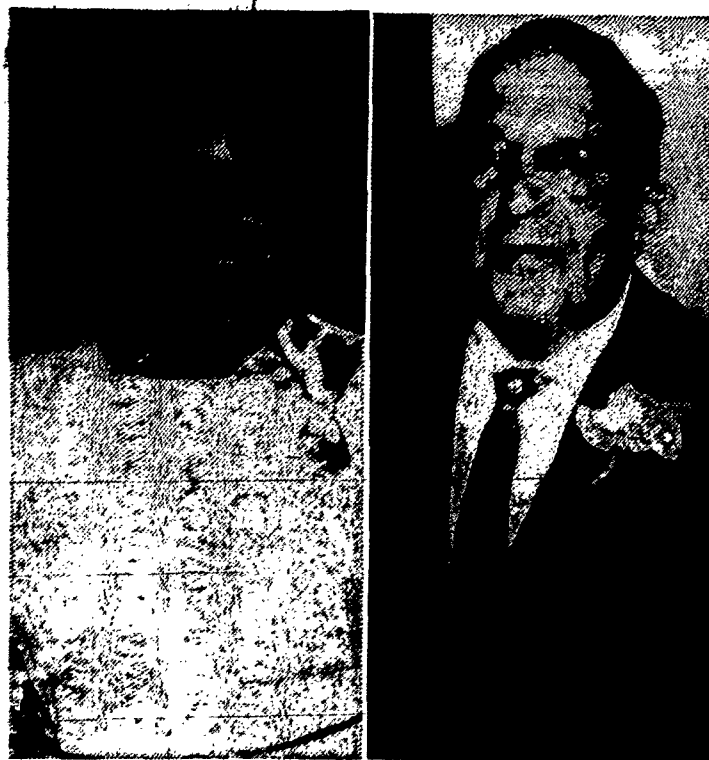
Corning Lists CYA Project

Over The Top, CYO Drive 4,481 Members

The CYO brought its thirty-first annual membership campaign to a triumphant conclusion Tuesday night with a final report of 4,481 members. This was 381 more than recruited in the 1961 campaign and brought a fervent "Thank You" from CYO Director, Rev. Eugene H. McFarland.

THE SPECIAL GIFTS committee under leadership of John M. Donohue reported 1873 memberships while the balance was turned in by twenty teams of men and women workers.

The women's division, under Mrs. John J. Weidner decisively defeated the men's group and had three team captains each reporting more than 200 per cent of quotas.

High captain of the entire campaign was Mrs. Theodore Kosch with 315 pct. followed by Miss Marie Barney, 287 pct. and Mrs. William F. Richards, with 252 pct. High individual leader was Mrs. Clifford Barney.

Henry J. Lindsay of the industrial division led the men captains with 195 pct. Following him came Louis Spiotto with 151 pct., Walter Samelstadt, 132 pct. and Urban Kress, 127 pct.

Other high captains included Mrs. Walter Kelly, 189 pct., Mrs. John H. Sokolsky, 182 pct., Mrs. Robert Rhodes, Mrs. J. M. Cappello, Mrs. John Apenitz, R. Corcoran and Mrs. Frederick Taddeo, all well over 100 pct.



Blanshard Keeps Up Anti-Catholic Battle

Oklahoma City — (NC) — Paul Blanshard, longtime critic of the Catholic Church, has joined forces here bent on keeping Catholic school students from riding on Midwest City public school buses.

Blanshard was listed as a consulting attorney in a brief filed on behalf of John L. Antone with the the Oklahoma Supreme Court.

The Antone brief was in answer to a pleading submitted by ten parents of children who attend St. Philip Neri School in Midwest City. The parents and

the Midwest City school officials appealed from a District Court ruling last year which barred Catholic students from riding the public school buses.

Until the court action was instituted, the Catholic students, in a "good neighbor" gesture, had been allowed to ride the buses along regular school routes.

The arrangement had the approval of Oscar Rose, Midwest City public school superintendent. The parents' brief with the state high court said the education of their children at the Catholic school served a public purpose and the bus ride assured greater safety for the youngsters.

The parents contended there are precedents in Oklahoma and other states by which aid is extended to church-related projects when they are rendered for the public welfare.

The Blanshard touch was evident in the Antone brief. Blanshard is a frequent rally speaker and legal counsel for Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State (POAU), an organization which consistently has opposed Catholic policies. He is the author of a number of books, including "American Freedom and Catholic Power" and "Freedom and Catholic Power in Spain and Portugal."
