### Vatican Paper Publishes Council Special Edition

Vatican City — (RNS) — A special issue of Osservatore Romano, Vatican City newspaper to commemorate the opening of the Second Vatican Council contained messages of greeting from President Kennedy and other heads of state.

The paper featured articles by a group of cardinals which discussed various aspects of the Vatican Council.

Gregory Peter XV Cardinal Agagianian, Prefect of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, discussed the growth of the Catholic faith throughout the world. Franz Cardinal Koenig, Archbishop of Vienna, dealt with the historical significance of the Council.

Augustin Cardinal Bea, president of the Vatican Secretariat for Promoting Christian Unity, discussed the work of that body, and William Cardinal Godfrey, Archbishop of Westminster, England, wrote on the Council and today's world.

Three noted Catholic laymen also contributed articles. They were: French author Henri Daniel-Rops, whose topic was "The Council and Culture"; Count Giuseppe dalla Torre, former editor-in-chief of Osservatore Romano, who discussed the reasons for calling the Council, and Raimondo Mazzone, the paper's present chief editor, who wrote on the Pope's role in the Council.

It was announced that 85 countries and international organizations would be represented at the public opening rites of the Vatican Council.

### Layman's Role Discussed At Book Review

"A thought-provoking study of the present position of Catholic laymen in America," was the reviewer's judgment on Donald Thorman's "The Emerging Layman. The reviewer was Dr. J. Raymond Hensler, Ph.D., speaking at last Tuesday's Noonday Book Review in the Catholic Evidence Library.

"THE LAYMAN'S" role is gradually becoming defined," claims author Thorman. "And it's not just to help out the over-burdened priest."

"Rather, it's for the layman to do his OWN job, which is to bring Christ and Christian principles into the marketplace. Each individual will be most effective in his own environment and with his own style."

There is a tremendous reservoir of educated practicing Catholics who should be lay apostles, but to date, this source has been hardly tapped, commented Dr. Hensler.

"There are plenty of Catholics who are anxious to serve Christ in the world, and many priests anxious to enlist lay apostles. But the two groups aren't always in the same place," says Thorman.

One weakness that is apparent, as the author underlines, is the lack of effective channels between the laity and the hierarchy. Thorman put this question to active laymen all over the country:

"How would you go about suggesting to your Bishop things that you would like to have brought up at the Ecumenical Council?"

Most of the answers indicated that most American laymen didn't feel that it was any of their business, and that they wouldn't know how to go about suggesting such ideas to their Bishop.

Another sore spot is the general ignorance of the Social Encyclicals among our laymen. "These should be the tools which we should be using to transform our society, and most of us don't yet know what the tools are."

Despite these factors, Dr. Hensler said, the tone of the book is optimistic and Donald Thorman feels that the responsible layman is going to be the rule, not the exception, in the future of the Church.
