Aquinas Eyes Win Over Cleveland

Just when Joe Repko, Aquinas Institute's head football coach, thought his varsity was living up to its potential, along came Linton High of Schenectady to change his mind.

The Lintons surprised the Irish, 20-0, in a hard fought contest.

The chief villian was Pat Riley, a 6-foot-3, 190-pound quarterback. Riley scored two touchdowns, kicked an extra point and, in general, lived up to his reputation as a triple threat man. He pierced the middle on trap plays almost at will.

UNTIL THE facing by Schenectady, Aquinas had acquitted itself notably. In its opener, it topped Corning, 20-7. Then it romped over Bishop Fallon, 39-7, and crushed Jamestown, 43-0.

Repko and his aides, Basil Marcella and George DeLong, had envisioned at least a close game with Linton. Their players had been improving steadily.

But the Blue Devils, playing at home before a capacity crowd were determined to cause damage. Linton, billed in the sport press as the number one gridiron power in the eastern part of the state, considered themselves the top school in the state by defeating Aquinas.

Linton's coach, former Colgate quarterback Dick Lalla, admitted his boys were up "sky-high" for the game and that they played their best game of the season against Aquinas.

REPKO WAS able to console himself after the game with the realization that, on paper, Aquinas was no pushover. His boys made 7 first downs and picked up 166 yards while the rushing yardage of the winners was 191 yards. Schenectady now owns a string of 18 wins in 20 outings.

While Linton glides to the end of the season with easy ones, Aquinas begins the toughest part of its schedule, including two Pennsylvania teams and powerful St. Joseph's of Cleveland.

Cleveland rolls into Aquinas Memorial Stadium Sunday, Oct. 21, at 2 p.m. sporting a 4-1 record and a team reputed to be every bit as good as last year's.

This marks the fifth appearance of the Vikings and they have not yet tasted defeat from the hands of Aquinas. Last season Aquinas bowed, 25-0, to the ultra-strong, slick-household opponent.

First in the local scholastic rating and widely hailed for their miserly defense, St. Joseph's stock was considerably bolstered last Saturday with a 36-8 win over a substantial Chancel, Ohio, eleven.

Big gun for the visitors is Dave Herrick, 180-pound halfback, who has 8 touchdowns and a sparkling 450 yards gained to his credit.

JACK SHEA, the quarterback who did so well against Aquinas last year has been shifted to defensive halfback and 2nd quarterback.

In the quarterback slot is junior Tom Schoen, a 5'11", 165-pound "boy wonder" who has completed over 50% of his passes, has thrown 7 touchdowns passes and scored 5 TD's rushing so far this season.

Cleveland, loser only to Erie Prep in a squeaker played in the mud, boasts a 217 pound line anchored by 230-pound, 6'1" Steve Troychak and 240-pound, 6'1" Larry Erwin. Batavia's ND High Next for McQuaid

Winless in its last two outings, McQuaid Jesuit High (2-1) will take its victory trip to Batavia on Saturday afternoon with an eye toward making Notre Dame High School its third victim of the season.

A McQUAID football campaign doesn't seem to be complete without at least one good rip-smortin' tie game, and the Knights took care of that item in exciting, if frustrating, fashion last Saturday night at Jamestown, New York, in a 13-13 standoff with the Red Raiders of Jamestown High.

In quarterback Tom Johnson they showed a clever passer and ball handler, and in halfback Russ Carcione one of the hardest running speedsters the Knights have faced in several seasons.

THE RAIDERS came close early in the last quarters only to fumble inside McQuaid's 20. By forcing the Knights to punt, however, Jamestown got another chance with about six minutes to play and 68 yards to cover. Two fourth-down pass completions were the key plays. One of them, with a fourth and five from McQuaid's 21, gave Jamestown a first-down on the 8.
