**Navy Chaplain
On Way To
Hawaii Duty**

Father Leo Ward, a priest of the Rochester Diocese in the Navy Chaplains Corps, will leave in mid November for a new assignment in Hawaii.

He has just completed duties at Quantic training base in Virginia and a trip to Germany.

Father Ward visited East Berlin, a city he described as drab — "as if painted over with a big grey brush."

He noticed few people on the streets although his tour of the Soviet controlled city was in the late morning on a pleasant September day. The few who were about were dressed quite shabbily.

West Berlin in contrast is a bustling city of obvious prosperity.

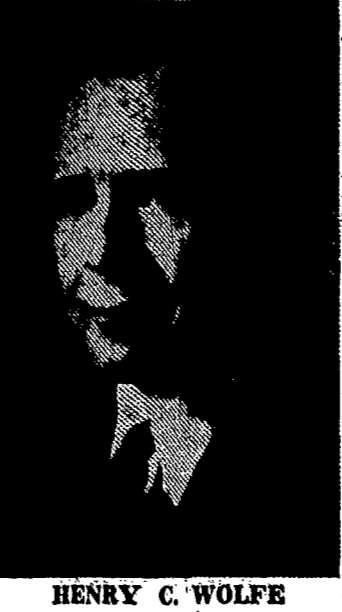
The grim wall dividing the two sections of the city is marked with crosses and bouquets where refugees from East Germany failed in their bid for freedom.

Father Ward holds the rank of lieutenant commander. His brother, Father Lawrence Ward, is an Air Force chaplain. He was in Rochester this week to visit his father, Peter Ward, his brother Vincent and several sisters.

Foreign Affairs Expert**

Foreign affairs authority Henry C. Wolfe will speak at Nazareth College Thursday afternoon, Nov. 15 at 3:30 p.m. Wolfe, who has just returned from another annual first-hand observation of Europe, will discuss "What's Happening in World Affairs." The lecture is open to the public.

WOLFE'S EXPERIENCE in world affairs goes back more than forty years. Following service in the post-war era as a member of the Hoover Commission in Soviet Russia. He

Wolfe has revisited the countries which have been most prominent in the news — with the exception of Russia and a few of her satellites. From these he was barred because of his account of Red plans for world domination in his book, "The Imperial Soviets."

Wolfe is also the author of numerous articles for our leading magazines and newspapers, and several of his articles have been chosen among the top ten by the Council of Librarians. By-lined editorial page articles by Wolfe have been featured in such publications as the WALL STREET JOURNAL and

also worked in the Balkans and the Near East.

Wolfe was in France when World War II broke out. The next year he visited South America. The following year he travelled 21,000 miles in the Pacific and Far Eastern areas. After Pearl Harbor he became an accredited War Correspondent. In the course of his World II service he entered Paris with General Leclerc's 2nd Armored Division that liberated the French capital.
