Catholic Youth Week Program Set In Auburn

Auburn — "REVERENT YOUTH—LOYAL LEADERS" is the theme for National Catholic Youth Week to be held in Auburn, Oct. 28 through November 4th, Rev. Gerald Connor, assistant pastor of St. Alphonsus, announced.

The Annual Observance, which has as its purpose to spotlight the efforts of Catholic young people and their adult leaders who are engaged in a positive program of spiritual and social activities, is being planned throughout Auburn.

FATHER CONNOR, commenting on the theme, stated that "with the lack of loyalty evidenced by some leaders in the field of industry, government and the entertainment world to their jobs and the American public, our young people must, more than ever, become aware of the need for loyalty in their actions of everyday living — reverence and respect for the moral and ethical code to guide their everyday actions not only as the youth of today but as the future leaders of tomorrow's world."

The opening day of the observance, Oct. 28, is the Feast of Christ the King, and it is designated as National Communion Sunday for youth. "The vast majority of youth of Auburn will attend special Masses and receive Holy Communion on that day," Father Connor said.

Since its inception, National Catholic Youth Week has grown from a few local observances to a program affecting the United States and its possessions and Catholics stationed in Military Bases overseas.
