### Another Unsung Hero

Among the unsung heroes of this world are those who quietly accept and carry out an unpopular task because it is their duty. Such a one is Colonel Arthur Levitt, member of the Board of Education, who was assigned by his fellow members to be the trial judge at the latest trials of New York City teachers who refused to tell the Superintendent of Schools whether they are or have been members of the Communist Party. Anyone reading the brief recommending their dismissal would know that his decision was arrived at after searching, careful, painstaking efforts to get at the truth and to see justice done.

For all his sacrifice in enduring the grueling days of the trials, for all his efforts to persuade these teachers not to destroy themselves by their silence, he had, on Thursday of last week, to sit through an hour and a half of abuse and vituperation from six of them, from two of their attorneys and from Rose Russell, legislative representative of the Teachers Union. He had to listen to this despite the fact that these teachers had obstinately refused to take the stand in their own defense notwithstanding his urgent and repeated pleadings to do so during the trial.

Their abuse convicts them, for it is the Communist tactic to substitute violence, vilification and the smear for the truth.

Gratitude, appreciation and honor are due Colonel Levitt for his devotion to his duty as a member of the Board of Education, a devotion which he had previously given to his country. Sympathy, too, is due his son, Lieutenant Arthur Levitt, Jr., who, in the uniform of the United States Air Force, sat quietly behind his father and followed to the above named man his sensitive, unassuming and reserved parent by those who would not or could not disclaim loyalty to Communism, an enemy which he is preparing to fight.
