Batavia Looms As McQuaid Foe

With its fourth victory and second straight high-scoring spree, a 4-6 triumph over Bradford (Pa.) Central Christian H.S., behind it, McQuaid Jesuit High turns this week to a future that promises, if not exactly blood, sweat and tears, at least no easy victories.

Next on the agenda is Batavia High School, set for Friday night at Batavia; and a week later, there's an undefeated Canisius High foe on tap over in Buffalo.

THE PROBLEM this week goes a bit beyond the immediate foe. Batavia is formidable, all right—McQuaid coach Tom Seymour got a good look at their tricky "bellyseries" offense in their rout of Corning Free Academy last week.

Of more concern, though, and that's saying a lot, is the fact that injuries and academic ineligibility will strip at least 14 players from the McQuaid roster for this particular game. Eleven are marks casualties, and three more—Mike Bestor, John Foster, and Bill Oestreich—are all sidelined with injuries, probably for the season. In the doubtful category with injuries are halfback Mike Spiegel and tackle Jim Nikas.

The temporary declination of the ranks comes at a time when the Knights were playing the kind of ball Seymour had hoped for this season. Fullback Jim Pezzulo's power running appears to have been the needed ingredient; his five touchdowns in the last two games have set the tone for the whole offense.
