### St. Francis Third Order Reports National Meet

Geneva — Father Anthony Gludice, O.F.M., Cap., spiritual director of the Immaculate Heart Third Order of St. Francis Fraternity of Geneva headed the delegation of tertiaries to the Ninth Quinquennial Congress Third Order Secular of St. Francis which was held at the Hotel Stater Hilton, Detroit, Oct. 24-28. Mrs. Bulger has been secretary of the national office of the Archconfraternity of Christian Mothers for fifteen years. 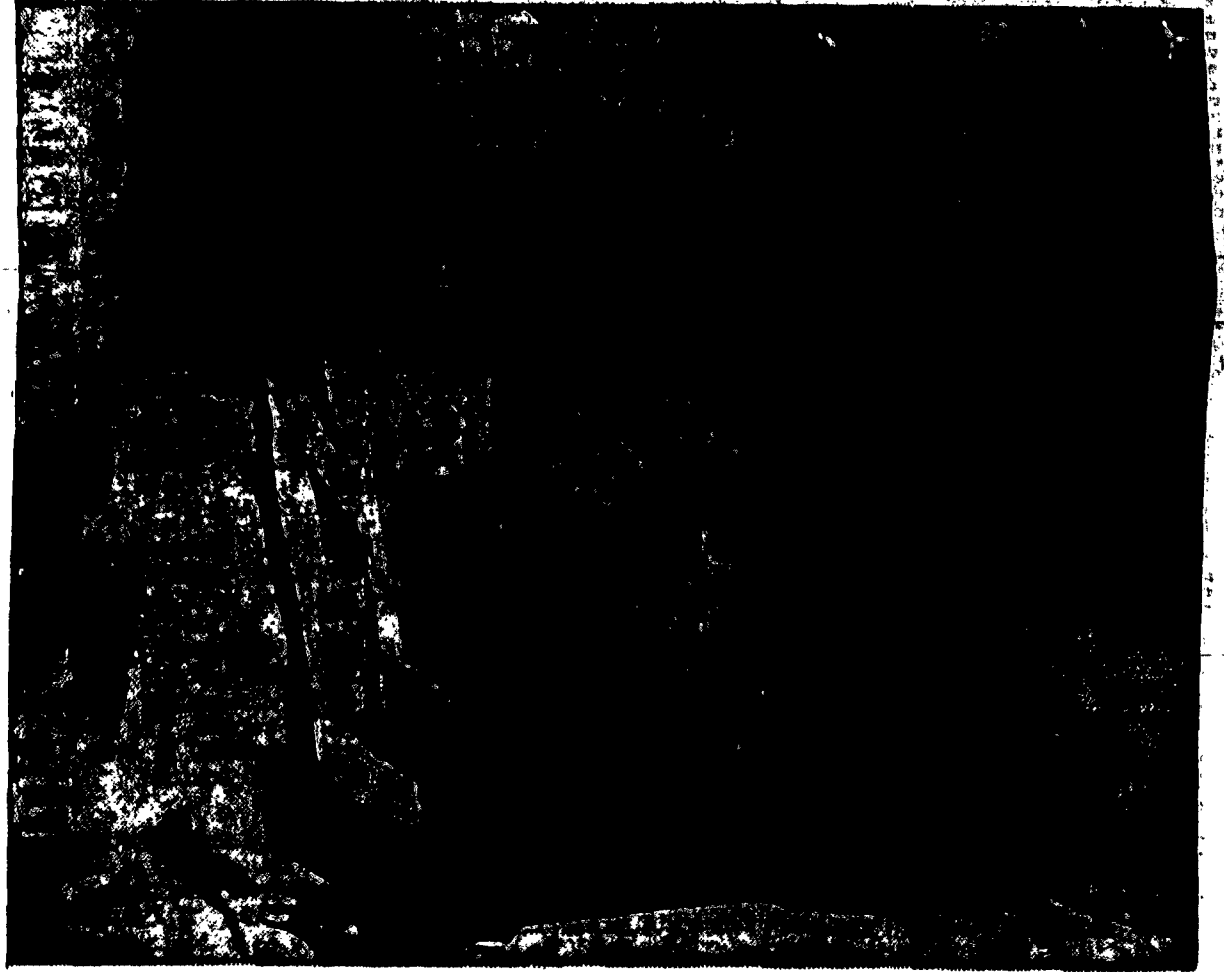
