This particular phase of the C.Y.O. Program is one of the many annual events prepared by the C.Y.O. Staff and personnel and offered to the Monroe County Parochial School children.

The final swimming meet, which pitted swimmers from various parochial schools, was held Saturday, Nov. 10. Holy Rosary School came in second in the meet, with St. James coming in for a close third.

OUTSTANDING performers for the meet were John Gould, Michael Cahill, Alan Killenbeck, Stephen Donahue, and Terrence Cahill. Not only

did the champions show up well in the individual events, but they captured first place in the 100 yard freestyle relay and 75 yard medley relay. The accumulative score of these boys was 47 points, which made them undisputed champions.

The boys from Holy Rosary did well in the relays as they placed second in the 100 yard freestyle relay and third place in the 75 yard medley relay. Raymond May, age ten, won the 25 yard breast stroke.

Another outstanding performer was William McGraw from St. James School. In the eleven and twelve year old group, young McGraw scored first in the fifty yard freestyle and in the 25 yard breast stroke event.

Others deserving special recognition for fine performances, were Thomas Kirlow and Joseph Werner from Corpus Christi School, Thomas DeLambert from St. Augustine, Johann Stagh from St. Bridget, and James Kellman from Sacred Heart.

27-6 Victory Over EFA Marks Opening Of Notre Dame High's New Stadium

Notre Dame played its first football game in the new N.D. stadium in Elmira Saturday evening, as the Crusaders whipped E F A 27-6.

It was a team victory all the way as the Crusaders methodically marched for four touchdowns while allowing only a fourth quarter tally to the Academy. The Crusaders scored their first TD as Mike Johnston hit end Bill Knott on a fourth and one situation from the E F A nine. This 70 yard drive gave the Crusaders a 7-0 lead at the half.

In the second half, the Crusaders literally ran away from their cross-town rivals. In the third quarter, signal-caller Mike Johnston marched the Blue and Gold 59 yards for their second score. Tom Salmon, Jim Ramich, Ron Limoncelli and Bernie Marosek shared the load while Johnston snuck over from the one. Jim Ramich set up the next score with an interception and a fine runback. This time a 45 yard drive was capped by a 24 yard Tom Salmon score.

Notre Dame's last score came as a result of a bad pass from a center punt attempt. This 23 yard drive was capped by a 3 yard Salmon run. Late in the fourth quarter Academy broke the ice for their only score. E F A halfback Ray Fratercangelo, who rushed for 212 yards, scored from the 15 after setting up the TD with a 45 yard scamper.

THE CRUSADERS moved like a well-oiled machine. Mike Johnston called a nearly perfect game, coming up with the big play when he needed it. Halfback Tom Salmon was the big gainer, picking up 94 yards in 12 carries. Fullback Jim Ramich cracked the Academy line for another 57 yards. The defensive line, though allowing 240 yards, was tough in the

clutch, three times stopping E F A drives.

Pre-game activities included the acceptance of the stadium by Father Joseph Reinhart on behalf of Sister Mary Alberta. Among the speakers were Mayor Edward Laganeiro, and Father Leo Dunn, C.S.S.R., representing the diocese of Rochester.

This game was the climax of

more than a year's work for the Athletic Association and countless volunteer workers. The game also capped Notre Dame's most successful season and their first under new mentor, Nick Testa.

Apathetic Attitudes

TV Taking Over Role of School

New York — (RNS) — A plea to combat apathetic attitudes on education was made here by Dr. Owen Kiernan, Massachusetts commissioner of education, at the seventh annual Teachers' Congress held at St. John's Roman Catholic University.

"No nation can achieve total fitness if its citizens are sideline sitters," he told the more than 800 persons attending the congress, which attracted teachers from both the public and parochial school systems.

"WHAT WE NEED today is a massive infusion or injection of a 'Six-K' Vaccine to awaken America," Dr. Kiernan asserted.

The Massachusetts educator estimated that 95 per cent of the average youngster's time is spent "glued to the end of a TV cathode tube, mesmerized by trivia."

He said he agreed with Newton Minow, chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, that television is becoming a powerful force rivaling the influences of other institutions in shaping the lives of children.

Because of the just-emerging Teletar, educational television is on the threshold of a new era, Dr. Kiernan suggested.

"Teletar may become 'just another piece of celestial hardware or a communication link designed to benefit humanity,'" he said.
