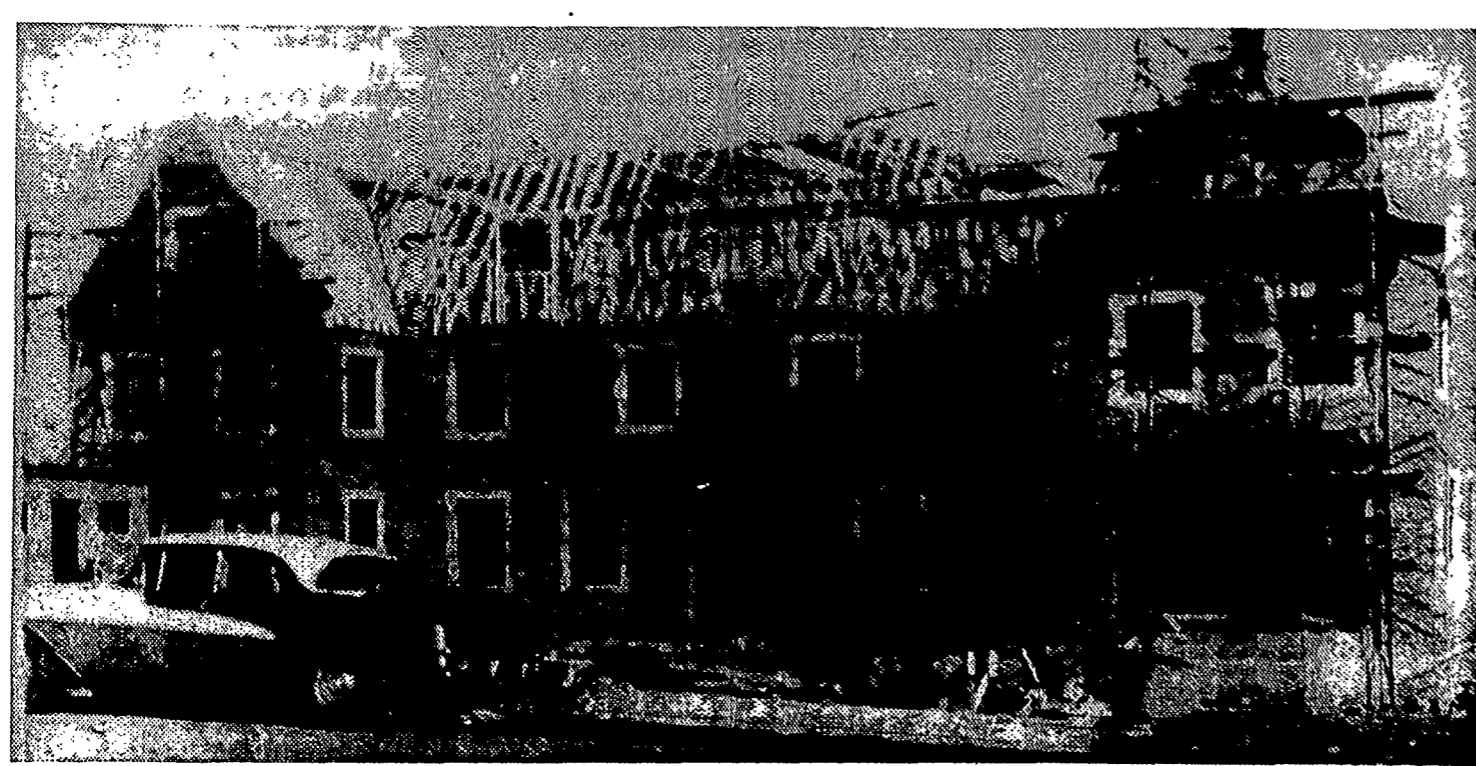

Representing a "sincere effort of the entire Catholic Courier staff to publish a truly outstanding number as a tribute to our new Shepherd," the Nov. 25, 1937, edition appeared with 40 pages plus a 32 page Diocesan Review and Calendarium. Sections included an eight page coverage of the installation of Bishop Kearney, with sections devoted to national and local news, up-to-date reports on diocesan lay groups, men and women and on diocesan organizations.

Dr. George Hermann Derry, K.C.S.G., nationally known educator and sociologist was scheduled to give two lectures in Rochester to launch the Knight of Columbus Crusade Against Communism.

Newspapers were warned against publishing subversive propaganda as factual news by the Rev. Dr. Frederick J. Zwierlein of St. Bernard's Seminary in an address to Rochester Ad Club members.

Corning Knights Cited On 65th Anniversary

Corning — Members of Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, noted on Wednesday, Nov. 14, the 65th anniversary of the founding of the Council. Oldtimers recalled that at a meeting in the Knights of Pythias Hall, a group of young Catholic men formed Council 281, to become one of the oldest of more than 6,000 KC groups throughout the North American continent and the possessions of the United States.

This occasion will be observed more completely by a dinner at 7 p.m. Dec. 1 in the K. of C. Home at Cedar and Second Sts., where Supreme Director Emmett Burke of New York City will be the speaker.

During the past 65 years, the Council has seen the expansion of its ranks to the point where the purchase and maintenance of the Council Home became feasible. In 1948 the unit was enlarged further as the wives and daughters of the Knights formed the unit's auxiliary, the Ladies of Columbus. The formation of the Columbian Squires two years ago has been the most recent expansion of the influence of the Council.

Many of the Council's members have distinguished both the Council and themselves in serving in various areas of civic life. Three Knights have served as mayors of the City of Corning. They were Dr. T. A. McNamara, James P. Hallahan and George E. Keenan.

At the present time a number of Knights are active in community life. These include four aldermen: Alexander Kosty of Ward 2, W. W. Babcock of Ward 4, Anthony Tammaro of

the Corning Council on its anniversary.

PLEDGES WERE sought for erection of a combination church and school building and a rectory on an 11 1/4-acre plot at the corner of Pittsford-Palmira Road (Route 31) and Wickford Way, two miles east of Pittsford Village.

Foundations have been laid for the church-school structure, slated for occupancy next September. St. John of Rochester School will begin with Grades 1, 2, 3 and 4, and will be staffed by the Sisters of Mercy.

Father LeVeque, now residing in a rented house at 30 Littlebrook Dr., Pittsford, expects to move into the new rectory, being constructed on Wickford Way, in January.

Nearly 200 men visited parishioners for pledges on two successive Sundays — Nov. 4 and 11.

Added inspiration was provided campaigners in an address by Bishop James E. Kearney, principal speaker at the committee dinner Nov. 10. His Excellency lauded the parishioners as "pioneers" in spreading God's kingdom "by establishing another Tabernacle of the Jesus Christ on earth."

At a final campaign report meeting Nov. 15 in the Bushnell's Basin Firehouse, Father LeVeque expressed appreciation for the cooperation of parishioners and committeemen, as well as for the efforts of nearly 100 women who conducted a street-by-street parish census.

HE ADDED a special word of commendation for the work of Arthur P. Farley, a representative of Foley Associates, Inc., Rochester, a Catholic fund-raising counselling firm, who

assisted in organizing and conducting the campaign.

Building fund payments will begin in January, the pastor said. Stressing the need for regular payments to the fund, he pointed out that estimated costs of the building project will exceed \$300,000, and that every dollar contributed will lessen the amount to be borrowed and interest payments on borrowed money.
