Bishop Offers Requiem For Joseph P. Flynn

Solemn Pontifical Mass of Requiem was offered by Bishop Kearney in St. Monica Church, Monday, Nov. 26 for Joseph P. (Stubby) Flynn, distinguished Rochester architect and Catholic lay leader.

Mr. Flynn, 67, of 243 Elmendorf Ave. died of cancer in his home Wednesday, Nov. 21, 1962 on his birthday.

Because so many who are called to their rewards cannot be eulogized adequately, Bishop Kearney said at the close of the Mass, it is not customary to speak of their deeds but in the case of one who had by his pen and mind done so much to glorify God, it was fitting to do so.

THE BISHOP likened Joseph P. Flynn to Sir Christopher Wren, the famed English architect. As at the time of the noted architect's death in Britain, a plaque was erected bearing the inscription "look around you and see." Bishop Kearney said to "look around" for monuments to the local architect's memory. Churches, hospital, high school, seminary, all the buildings he designed were centered upon the fact that the tabernacle of the Real Presence was within each building.

Bishop Kearney was assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. James C. McAniff, P.A., V.G., assistant priest; Rev. Thomas C. Kane, deacon; Rev. Gerald Dunn, sub-deacon; Rt. Rev. Msgr. Gerald C. Lambert and Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, deacons of honor; Very Rev. Msgr. Edward J. McAniff, master of ceremonies with students of St. Andrew's Seminary in minor officiating.

In attendance also were the Right Reverend Monsignors John E. Maney, Chancellor; William J. Naughton, Leslie G. Whalen, John M. Duffy and Edward K. Ball, V.F.

Among the many buildings designed by Mr. Flynn were McQuaid Jesuit High School, St. Patrick's Church, Seneca Falls; St. Francis, Phelps; St. Vincent de Paul, Corning; St. Boniface and St. Helen's in Rochester as well as high school addition of DeSales High School, Geneva.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ruth King Flynn; daughter, Mrs. William (Sheila) Bianchi; five grandchildren and his sister, Mrs. Raymond Cooper.

Burial was in St. Vincent de Paul Cemetery, Churchville, where prayers were led by Father Raymond P. Nolan, assisted by some ten priests including Rev. John L. Maxwell. Arrangements were by Alvah Halloran and Son Funeral Home.

POAU Blames Vatican For Zoning Law Change

Washington — (RNS) — A high-rise apartment project planned for the nation's capital by an Italian real estate investment corporation is the target of a nation-wide letter-writing campaign, government officials reported here, because of allegations that it has received zoning favoritism due to "influence from the Vatican."

The apartment and office building project, known as the Watergate Towne, will overlook the Lincoln Memorial and the proposed National Cultural Center which is to be built nearby.

IT IS BEING financed by the Societe Generale d'Immobilier de Rome, a corporation in which opponents of the project claim, the Holy See reportedly has a large investment.

The letter-writing campaign, which has brought more than 2,000 communications in less than a month to the Senate District of Columbia Committee headed by Sen. Alan Bible (D-Nev.) and about 1,500 letters to the White House, has been urged by Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State (POAU).

Dr. C. Stanley Lowell, associate executive secretary of POAU, said, "The request of sponsors of the project for relaxation of the 90-foot limit on height in this area to 130 feet would have gotten nowhere, if it had not been for the Vatican money involved."

There is a limitation on the height of buildings erected within the District of Columbia so that they do not overshadow the U.S. Capitol and other national monuments. In most areas near federal buildings, the limit is 90 feet, which allows for 8 or 9 stories; while no building anywhere in the city may be higher than the Capitol dome, 150 feet, which permits 12 or 13 floors.

The higher a building goes, the cheaper is the over-all construction cost per square foot, and the more profitable it becomes, a District of Columbia official explained, and the limitations on height are constantly under pressure from builders.

Laymen Named Trustees of Catholic Univ.

Rome — (NC) — Five Catholic laymen have been elected new members of the board of trustees of the Catholic University of America and of the board of trustees of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, both in Washington, D.C.

They are: John A. Coleman of New York; James Keely of Baltimore; James A. McGranery of Washington; John McShain of Philadelphia; and Andrew P. Maloney of Newark, N.J.

The election of the five was announced by Cardinal Spellman of New York in his capacity as chairman of the two boards of trustees. Meetings of the two boards were held here where the prelates who are members are taking part in the Second Vatican Council.

The board of trustees of the Catholic University is made up of the Archbishops of the United States ex officio and a number of elected bishops, priests and laymen. The newly elected trustees increase both the size of the two boards and their lay representation.
