Rosary-Making

"Rosaries, broken: what do with" was the subject of this column some time ago.

Result of that was a list of places where broken rosaries could be sent, thanks to a number of readers. These rosaries would be repaired and sent to the missions.

One such letter, arriving recently, gives more detailed information about Our Lady of Fatima Rosary-Making Club, a non-profit organization, incorporated in the State of Kentucky.

Writer of the letter, Mrs. Robert E. Hughes (Eileen F. Hughes), 9500 Boyer Place, Silver Spring, Maryland, gives us a close-up of what a Rosary Making Guild really is.

WRITES Mrs. Hughes: "We (of our own Guild) would be so happy to mend and put in first class condition any rosaries that you or your readers would care to send. We should like to include many of your readers to weed out their broken rosaries for a worthy cause.

"Our present Guild consists of almost 50 members and we make rosaries, for favorite or foreign missions, sending them for the conversion of our neighbors all over the world. It is such a rewarding hobby, requiring patience and a deep desire to do something for Mary, our Blessed Mother. We receive our supplies from OUR LADY OF FATIMA ROSARY MAKING CLUB, 1630 South Fifth Street, Louisville 8, Kentucky. Guilds can be formed in any parish where a hobby is welcomed."

Further contact with Mrs. Hughes reveals that this is an absorbing and heart-warming hobby, more than a "hobby" really, this making of rosaries. She tells of collecting broken rosaries, of making them from scratch, both from supplies sent by the central organization and from beads that accumulate in your jewelry box and ours, in bureau drawers, even in pockets along a necktie breaks...

LEARNING To chain rosaries is simple, Mrs. Hughes tells us, though it seems unbelievably complicated to one who tries to retrieve a favorite rosary with a pair of eyebrow tweezers. You get the thing squinched together in one spot and it breaks in another. Frustration to the nth. It would be so nice to have a piece of rope, knotted into decades, as the monks did in days of yore—even go back to saying the rosary on one's own eight fingers, and two thumbs.

A rosary, however, a real rosary, is very important, in the mission fields and at home tucked under a pillow, for so lace at night at home, for help during the day. In the missions, throughout the world, our priests and nuns want to give to their recent converts a something-to-hold-in-the-hand for the counting of prayers, to make the rosary more meaningful, to help them as our rosaries help us.

These rosaries are worn about the neck, the missionaries tell us, a sort of Christian symbol. Moreover, they are carried throughout life and buried with those who have cherished this symbol.

Mrs. Hughes of Silver Spring, Md., and her group, along with the other more than 400 organized groups in the U.S. are making strong, lifetime rosaries for countless missionaries to pass out all over the world. More than 100,000 are sent to the missions annually.

How do they do it, these thousands of people? How do they manage to send rosaries to the missions?

FIRST OF ALL, they start with a sense of dedication. Their hearts are in it, quite soon, their fingers.

The beginner's kit comes with instructions, materials for 10 rosaries and a special pair of pliers (these are precision made instruments that withstand hard use. After a few lessons, you can make an entire rosary in less than an hour, they tell us.

The "pros", Mrs. Hughes and the other groups, can recoup any old beads you might have about the house, can make them into rosaries that will be priceless throughout the mission fields.

Moreover, they can repair a rosary, precious for its intrinsic or sentimental value, and return it to you. Then if you want to make a donation toward buying more supplies for rosaries to be sent to the missions, to prisons, hospitals and the like, that is up to you.

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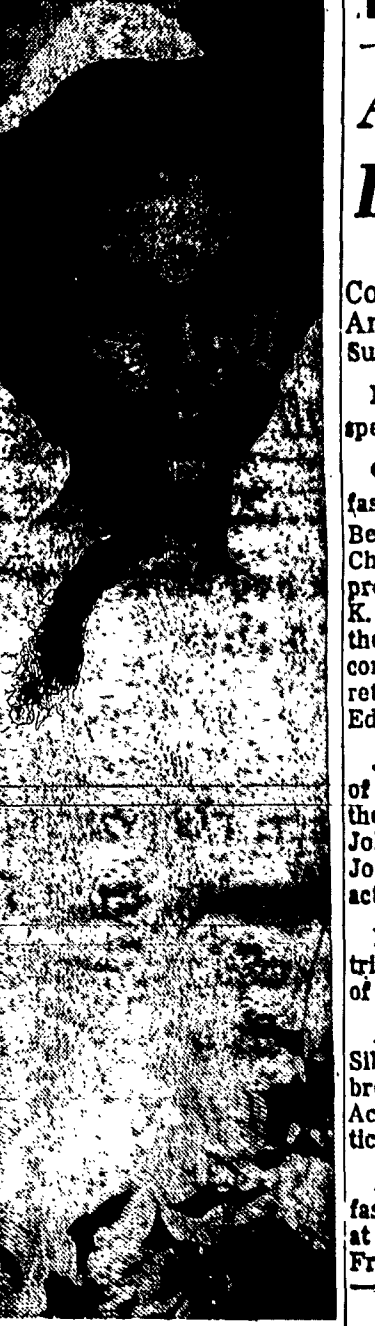
Anne Culkin At Academy

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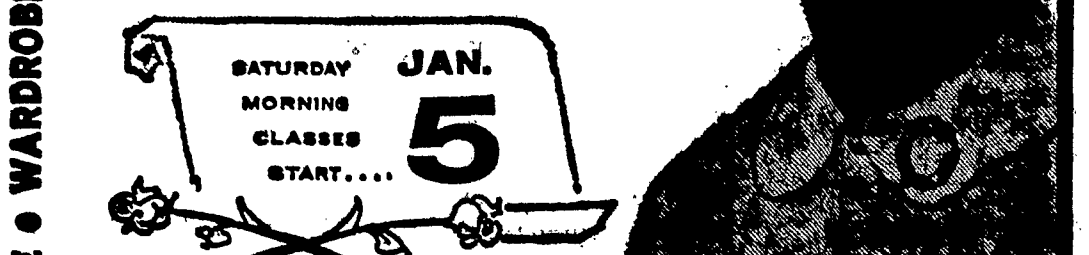


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
