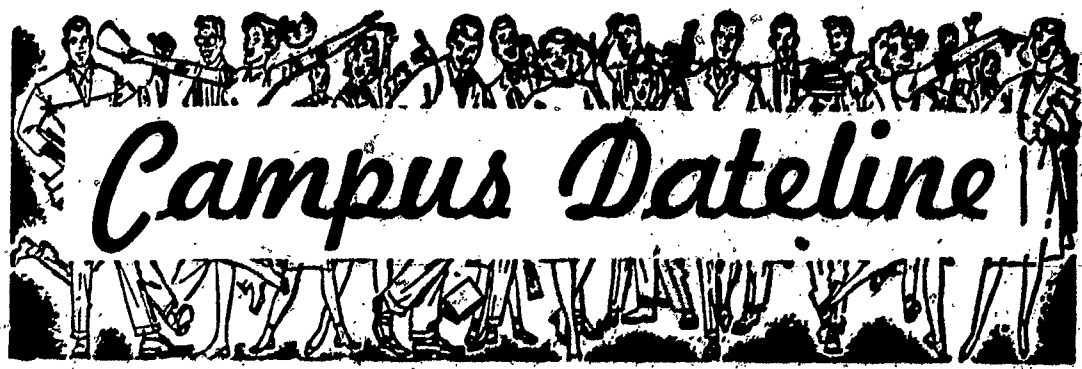


Scholarship Roll

Awarded Grant

Three Mercy High faculty members, Sister Mary Aquin, Sister Mary Edward and Miss Mary Burkett, have been awarded grants for in-service study. From the National Science Foundation Sister Aquin, head of Mercy's mathematics department, has received a grant covering tuition fees and text materials for a fall-term course at the University of Rochester in abstract algebra, called "Algebra from the Modern Standpoint." Sister Aquin will also take a course in the spring, "Calculus for Teachers," stressing

the subject matter of beginning calculus. Sister Mary Edward, science department head, also awarded a grant by the NSF, is studying meteorology at the University of Rochester.

Miss Burkett has been awarded a tuition grant by the New York State Department of Education for two courses in the Russian language to be taken during the academic year 1962-63. She is registered in the School of Liberal and Applied Studies at the University of Rochester.

Maryknoller Set

Father Andrew Cassidy of the Maryknoll Fathers will speak to St. Agnes High School students, Monday, Dec. 3, in the school auditorium. Father Cassidy, on temporary assignment to the United States, will acquaint students with Maryknoll's mission work, drawing on his own experience of six years in Mexico.

A native of New York City, Father Cassidy attended Regis High School, St. John's University in Brooklyn, and Yale University. During World War II, he served with the Armed Forces in Europe.

Entering Maryknoll after the war, he was ordained in 1954 and assigned to Mexico. Following his talk, Father Cassidy will conduct a question period for the students.

Accompanying them to the conference will be Dorothy Koster, a senior at Nazareth Academy, who was chosen to be a member of the All-State Orchestra from a group of seventy-six "6-A" flutists who auditioned through the state.

The other flutists were given a position in this orchestra which will be led in rehearsal and performance by Marvin Rablin, currently conductor of the Boston University Orchestra, and the Greater Boston Youth Symphony.

The All-State Orchestra will perform for those at the convention on Wednesday morning, Dec. 5, and will be taped for a later nationwide television showing.

The Concord Hotel, Kiamasha Lake, near Monticello, is the site of the conference.

The Catholic high school's Science-Math Seminar has now swung into its fourth year. The membership, limited to 50, is drawn from five of the Catholic high schools: Aquinas, McQuaid, Mercy, Nazareth and St. Agnes. Participants are chosen by their individual schools and are in the tenth, eleventh or twelfth year. The seminar's purpose is to bring together scientists employed by industry and students who will follow in their footsteps in the years to come.

This inter-high science group meets weekly on Tuesday nights at Our Lady of Mercy High School. Sister Mary Edward, Mercy faculty member, is the moderator.

The second cycle, now just begun, consists of a quantum chemistry series given by Dr. Lawrence J. Garfield and Dr. Albert Buetner, both of Eastman Kodak Company, and a math cycle being given by Mrs. Madeline F. Dudeck and Helene M. Donnelly, both employed by Kodak.

In December, there will be two meetings conducted by Sister Jane, S.S.J., on Philosophy and the Natural Sciences. Sister Jane is Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Nazareth College.

The first cycle just concluded offered a biology section, Principles of Drug Action, given by Mr. William Downe of the University of Rochester Medical Center.

There was also a physics section, Solid State Science, conducted by Dr. Mario Acitelli and including lectures on the Effects of Radiation on Solids by Dr. Norbert J. Kreidl; Energy Bands in Solids by Dr. Joseph L. Rood; and the Effect of High Pressure on Solids by Dr. Dean A. Buckner. These men are employed by Bausch and Lomb.

The seminar will include three more cycles between January and May.

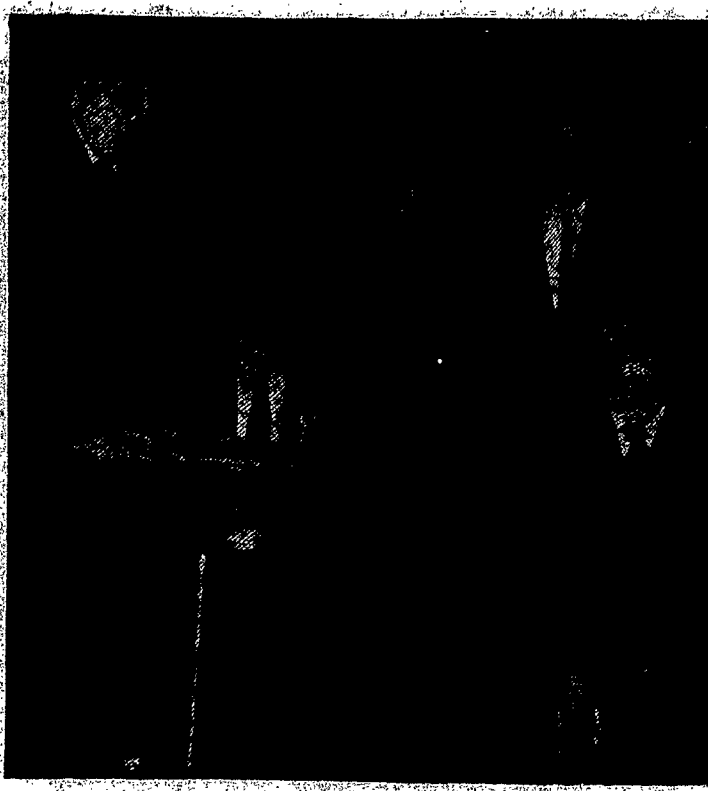
