Educators Ponder

Religion Study In Colleges

Philadelphia — (RNS) — Religion belongs on the academic roster of the public college and university and can be taught as objectively as the arts and sciences.

This was the prevailing view of most of the participants in an interreligious seminar, one of the first of its kind on "Religion and Higher Education" sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews, as part of a study at the community level on "Religious Freedom and Public Affairs."

A GROUP OF about 75 educators, community leaders, pastors and university chaplains took part in the regional, six-hour seminar here. The group was largely in agreement that religion courses had not only academic merit but could also enhance scholarship in general with moral tone, and create religious goodwill.

Dr. John J. Meng, president of Hunter College, New York, and a prominent Roman Catholic layman, as the keynote speaker, emphasized that an understanding of the major theological part of the world is an essential part of a well-rounded education, and that an ignorance of them is the cause for most religious intolerance among otherwise educated persons — Jew, Catholic, or Protestant.

"It is inconsistent to try to expand the scope and depth of education and at the same time

try to exclude religion... especially since our social structure of ethics and morals are founded on the teachings and practices of the Judeo-Christian tradition," Dr. Meng declared. "Even the atheist lives in accord with a code of conduct derived from theological and religious sources."

Dr. Meng continued: "Much of the sub-structure and a good portion of the super-structure of modern society is intimately related to or intertwined with religious and theological teachings and considerations. Indeed, the sorriest chapters of modern history have been written by leaders and followers who had but an imperfect, warped knowledge of the religious tenets of their fellow men. Out of such lack of knowledge stem persecution, discriminations, hatreds and social disharmonies."

"Intolerance of some Catholics toward Jews or evangelical Christians, the animosity of many Protestants towards 'Romanism,' the touchy decision with which some Jews regard Christians, and the 'chip-on-the-shoulder' attitude of atheists at the mention of any religion are for the most part sad commentaries on their mutual ignorance."

In endorsing "objective" and "non-sectarian" religion courses, Dr. Meng said: "Indoctrination is as improper in this area as in any area of education. Just as communism can be taught without making Communists, or the 'Mein Kampf' without rebuilding Nazism, we can teach the Talmud and the dogmas of Catholicism without conversions or apostasies."

"Such teaching is much more apt to result in a lessening of antipathies, a weakening of bigotry, and an easing of social tensions, as it is recognized how each religion has contributed to our civilization."

First Mass In 300 Years

Bury St. Edmunds — (NC) — Mass has been offered at England's Ixworth Abbey near here for the first time in 325 years.

Father Anthony Bull, C.R.L., prior of the Canons Regular of the Lateran at Datchet, just west of London, celebrated the Mass (Oct. 21) in a small pillared cellar of the abbey. The abbey was a priory of the Canons Regular until it was seized under King Henry VIII in 1537 and turned into a private home.

A Catholic family owned it until fines imposed because of loyalty to the Church of Rome drove the family to bankruptcy.

After that, the abbey stayed in non-Catholic hands until it was recently purchased by a Catholic, Dr. Alan Rowe.

Eastern Rites Form Agency

Vatican City — (RNS) — An historic precedent was established here when six Middle East patriarchs in union with Rome agreed to set up machinery for mutual collaboration and consultation.

The decision was reached at a meeting of the heads of the various Oriental Rite communities attending the Second Vatican Council. The meeting took place at the residence in Rome of Maronite Rite Patriarch Paul Peter Meouchi.

First step, it was announced, will be the creation of a working committee comprising two bishops from each of the six communities who will draw up lists of subjects of common concern to be submitted to the patriarchs for their consideration.

Religious Bias Clouds Aid Issue

Worcester — (RNS) — A suggestion that all members of the 88th Congress be obliged to state their political position on federal aid to education before debate begins on any administration proposals was urged by The Catholic Free Press, official newspaper of the Diocese of Worcester.

It asked in an editorial: "Does the United States of America need federal aid to education? Not federal aid to public schools only or federal aid to public schools and non-public schools, but just plain, good old-fashioned federal aid?"

"For nearly two years now," the paper continued, "ever

since President Kennedy first proposed his education bill to the last Congress, a battle has raged. However, it has not raged over the basic question of whether or not federal aid to education is either necessary or desired at this time. Rather, the battle has raged over who should get the aid.

"Neither the American people nor their representatives in Congress, have ever conclusively gone on record," the Wor-

cester paper continued, "either for or against the President's basic proposal. They have been so wrapped up in a side-line skirmish over whether or not aid should go to non-public schools as well as public schools."

"The side skirmish, however, has taken the spotlight away from the basic question and distorted the picture completely. Religious emotions have become entangled with political passions and the result, at least until now, has been a caustic exchange over the 'separation of Church and State.'"

To solve the dilemma, The Free Press proposed that all

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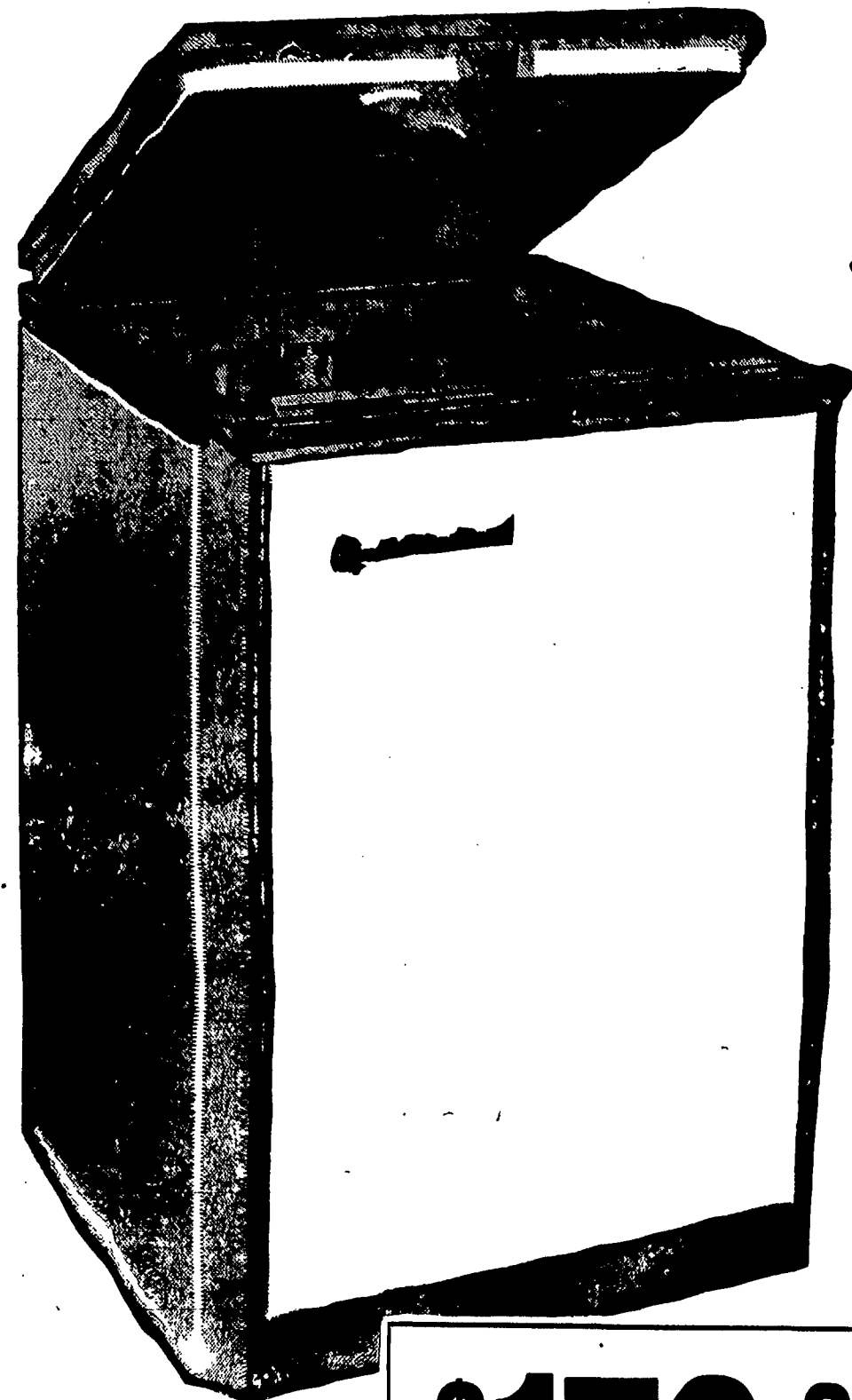
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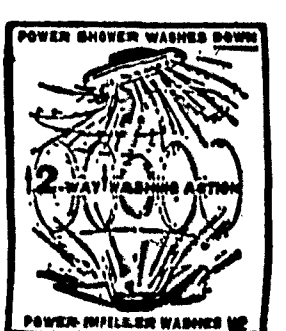
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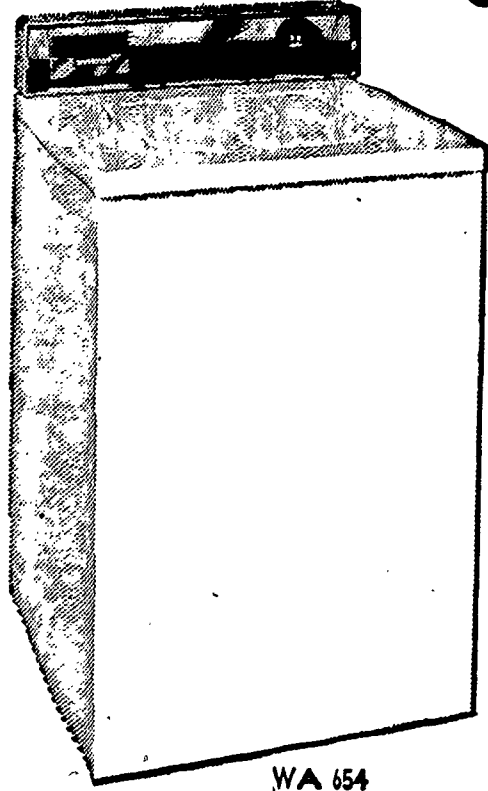
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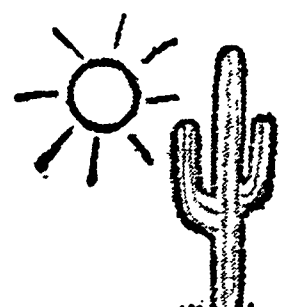
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
