Merry Christmas, Father!

"Twenty-one shopping days until Christmas."

This you read in your morning paper, the entire count-down designed to stimulate the "buy-buy" spirit. After all, 21 "shopping days" make three whole weeks, so why get panicky?

Last year, when this column printed a "What to get for Sister" treatment, there was a veritable bombardment on a kindred subject. The requests had to do with "What Father would like," — the parish priest, counselor, confessor, spiritual adviser, friend or relative in the priesthood.

"It's hard enough," Mrs. R.G.S. wrote, "to get a suitable present for each of the men on our list, but when some of them are priests, what can you do? For the others, one can always resort to neckties, but — give Roman collars?"

ON THE HEELS of that, came this:

"Our pastor, God bless him, has been a true friend, a bulwark for our family. This year we would have been on the rocks without his sage counsel. Honestly, we never can repay him, but we should like to say 'Thank you, Father' in some way at Christmas time. Can you suggest a present for a priest? We are not wealthy, but we — my husband, children and I want to give our pastor something that will be meaningful, right from our hearts."

Unfortunately, most of the letters came too late, last year, to line up "what Father would like," what he would have included in his letter to Santa Claus.

Paraphrasing the popular commercial, it was decided to go to "the man who is one," a priest.

MATTER OF fact, several priests were visited and interviewed. Here are some suggestions from those consulted. By and large, we believe, this makes a good cross-section: a priest-teacher, a pastor in a metropolitan center, one in a country parish, two monks.

"Books," said all of them. Priests being what they are, a well-chosen book will be a stimulant in the quiet hours, a

companion at any time. However, selection of a book is a delicate, as well as a deliberate, operation. You must know your priests, know his taste, what he likes to read.

Then, there are magazine subscriptions: to a news magazine, a sporting journal (probably baseball), to the American Ecclesiastical Review. This last has proved a Godsend to many a priest who wants to keep up with what is going on in his own field — particularly welcome to a priest who is stationed in a lonely section, far from fellow-priests.

Always in order is the brevity with its new rubrics, which will be changed again, but which priests want to have as much as their mothers want the latest cookbooks.

One newcomer into the field of suggestions is a gift the average lay person would never know about: an assemblage of printed cards, Baptismal cards: "Remembrance of the Baptism of _____," by Rev. _____, followed by the date. These are especially cherished by converts, a priest told us the other day, and from his personal experience.

There is note paper, short: "From the desk of Father _____." Also, golf balls, shaving materials (a little more on the luxurious side than Father would purchase for himself) and, as one of the monks said, "I just never have enough socks and handkerchiefs — black and white presents — unimagined, perhaps, but they're for me!"

FOR A PRIEST relative, or a dear friend, there might be the conversion of an old-time pocket watch — perhaps one owned by an ancestor — into a pyx, carrying case for the Blessed Sacrament. This is done by having the watch part removed, a firm rim of gold, that which held the watch, inserted to hold the Host, base and cover close tightly as in the original watch. This is a life-time, precious gift for any priest.

Back to the more inexpensive, but still meaningful gifts — for one must always remember the dignity of the priesthood — there are records. And priests enjoy records as much as do the rest of us. For example, the stereo "These Things I Wish for You," the Jesus and Mary Church Group, novices and Religious of Jesus and Mary under direction of Mother Marie Laetitia, R.J.M.; "Patterns in Song," the Jesus and Mary Choral Group of novices and postulants. Also, there is the Mass as recorded by a native African group, with drums — its "Sanctus" really stirring, as is the entire Mass.

There are goodies from your own kitchen, those home-made items. "Like Mother used to make." They go for these as they did when they were ten years old. And for a group of priests, as in a monastery, not the elaborate "fruit basket" arrangement, but an assemblage of fruits, nuts, cookies in a wicker basket, even in a cardboard carton, with a gay bow on top and a card "Merry Christmas, You-All!"

Here's hoping these suggestions will answer questions posed last year, and provide a starter for a "Merry Christmas, Father!" for the priest, or the priests, you wish to remember.
