Two McQuaid Seniors Take Debate Honors

Two McQuaid seniors, practically next door neighbors in Brighton, combined their debating talents last weekend to capture one of the toughest tournaments in the East.

Bryan DeLeo, 119 Commodore Parkway, and Thomas Maier, of 158 Commodore Parkway, took first place in a field of 88 schools at the annual St. John's University Forensic Tournament in New York. In a competition which required each team to debate both the negative and affirmative side of the topic, the two McQuaid representatives survived a one-loss-and-out elimination to get into the 10-school final round. There, with three judges sitting in on each debate, they took both of their debates to finish with a perfect 4-0 record. The greater margin of their last two wins gave the McQuaid team the first place trophy over three

Brooklyn schools, Xavierian, St. Brendan's, and Brooklyn Prep. Especially notable in the victory was the fact that the McQuaid debaters were working with the topic for the first time. On the other hand, the topic, Resolved: That the United States should engage in reciprocal free trade with non-Communist countries, has been used by the downstate schools since the beginning of the school year. Another highlight of the McQuaid contingents tournament showing was the eighth-place finish of orator Stephen Mayka, of 111 Knollwood Drive, Pittsford, in a field of 140 extemporaneous orators.

Castle to be Art Center

Gloucester — (RNS) — A feudal castle housing a priceless collection of medieval art treasures will be donated to the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Boston, it was learned here.

John Hays Hammond, Jr., famed inventor, announced that Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston, has agreed to accept the Hammond Museum. The prelate, Mr. Hammond said, plans to use the property as a cultural center for Catholic college students.

Mr. Hammond, now 72, built the castle in 1926 with stones, facades and entire rooms he bought during years of travel in Europe.

The heart of the structure is a great hall, 100 feet long, 25 feet wide and 58 feet high. Originally part of an Italian castle, it was imported here block by block and rebuilt. The exterior of the castle, which includes a drawbridge, moat and massive iron doors, covers three centuries of architectural development.

No Palace For Prelate

Medellin — (NC) — A Colombia Archbishop has decided to give his inheritance and the use of his house for the benefit of workers and the poor.

Archbishop Tulio Botero Salazar of Medellin said that his family inheritance is not so large as some think, but that he will give it all "to the last cent, keeping none at all" for himself.

"It will all be used for workers and the poor," he said.

The Archbishop has decided to rent a modest house to serve as a residence, making the archiepiscopal residence available as a training center for labor leaders.

"The archiepiscopal residence," the Archbishop pointed out, however, "was built not with my money, but with that of the archdiocese. As archbishop, I can grant the use of the building to the school for labor leaders, but not the ownership. It will continue to be the property of the archdiocese."

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Birth Control Info Endorsed

Chicago — (NC) — A Jewish group representing Reform congregations has endorsed a state program for distribution of birth control information while a Catholic interracial group has expressed opposition to it.
