Aquinas Drubs McQuaid

For the second holiday in a row the Little Irish of Aquinas took full advantage of their superiority under the backboards to defeat McQuaid Jesuit High, 48-33, before a crowd of almost 5,000 at Rochester's War Memorial last Saturday night.

The game was as easy for the Irish as the score would indicate, unlike last December's thriller which went down to the wire in overtime. Ron Mack's boys, using a deliberate offense that saw them attempt only 42 shots, succeeded in taking the zip out of a McQuaid attack that needed speed to be effective. In trying to inject that speed into a game which Aquinas was obviously quite content to play close to the vest, McQuaid was guilty of a steady procession of violations that kept the Knights from getting off more than 46 attempts from the field. Only 12 of them found their mark—a 26 percent shooting mark—as compared to the 36 percent chalked up by Aquinas.

A SEVEN-POINT run by the Irish all but tucked the game away in the closing moments of the first half. Aquinas was leading, 20-16, with 1:15 remaining, and the game had apparently settled down into a basket-trading duel, when the decisive string began. Tom Pestorius, one of the 6-5ers (Jack Hurley was the other) who contributed mightily in the rebounding department, pumped in a jumper

from the side to make it 22-16, and top scorer John McCarthy drove in for a three-point play for a 25-16 bulge.

Then, with only four seconds left, senior Bob Schwab, who had just entered the game, sank a pop shot from the foul line, and the Irish took a comfortable 11-point lead into the locker room with them. Quite a switch from the game's opening minutes when baskets by Dicw Updaw and Dick Spies had McQuaid ahead, 4-0.

In the second half, McQuaid switched to a man-to-man defense in an effort to harry the Irish into a collapse; but the Knights were still unable to grab more than an occasional rebound, and Aquinas retained the ball control that it needed to sit on its lead.

Actually, the Irish went out and upped the margin to 35-18 within four minutes, as McCarthy, Bill Abel, and Roy LaForce all hit from the field, and McCarthy added two fouls. From there on, only the final score remained to be decided. McQuaid, with coach Ken Jones substituting freely in a search for an effective combination, was unable to get closer than 43-30. The Knights' 5-for-14 foul shooting over the last two periods assured their Dewey Ave. rivals of the easiest win in the series since 1960 when Aquinas won a 65-38 coaster.

MCCARTHY TOOK scoring honors for the game with 17

points, including 9 straight from the foul-line. Abel and LaForce, a steady backcourt duo, posted 8 and 7 respectively, and Pestorius had 6. All four, along with Hurley, chipped in on the rebounding job that kept the ball away from McQuaid.

For the losing Knights, Gerry McCabe and Sam Iacone each had six.

Aquinas now leads the series, 4-2, and Mack, whose coaching career is now in its fourth year with the Irish, holds 3 league wins.

The preliminary game proved vastly more exciting to the early-arriving crowd, as McQuaid's unbeaten J.V. shook off a stubborn Aquinas team to win, 48-43. Bob Brady's backcourt play and John Stanley's 16 points were highlights in the Squires' triumph, their sixth straight and 23rd over two seasons.

Another high spot of the evening, though not of the competitive variety, was the intermission performance of the Aquinas marching band and colorful drill team. A good portion of the crowd forsook their halftime stretch to watch the white- and-scarlet uniformed musicians play with precision all the way from "South Rampart St. Parade" to "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

A winter week end is planned for the student body of the Academy of the Sacred Heart.

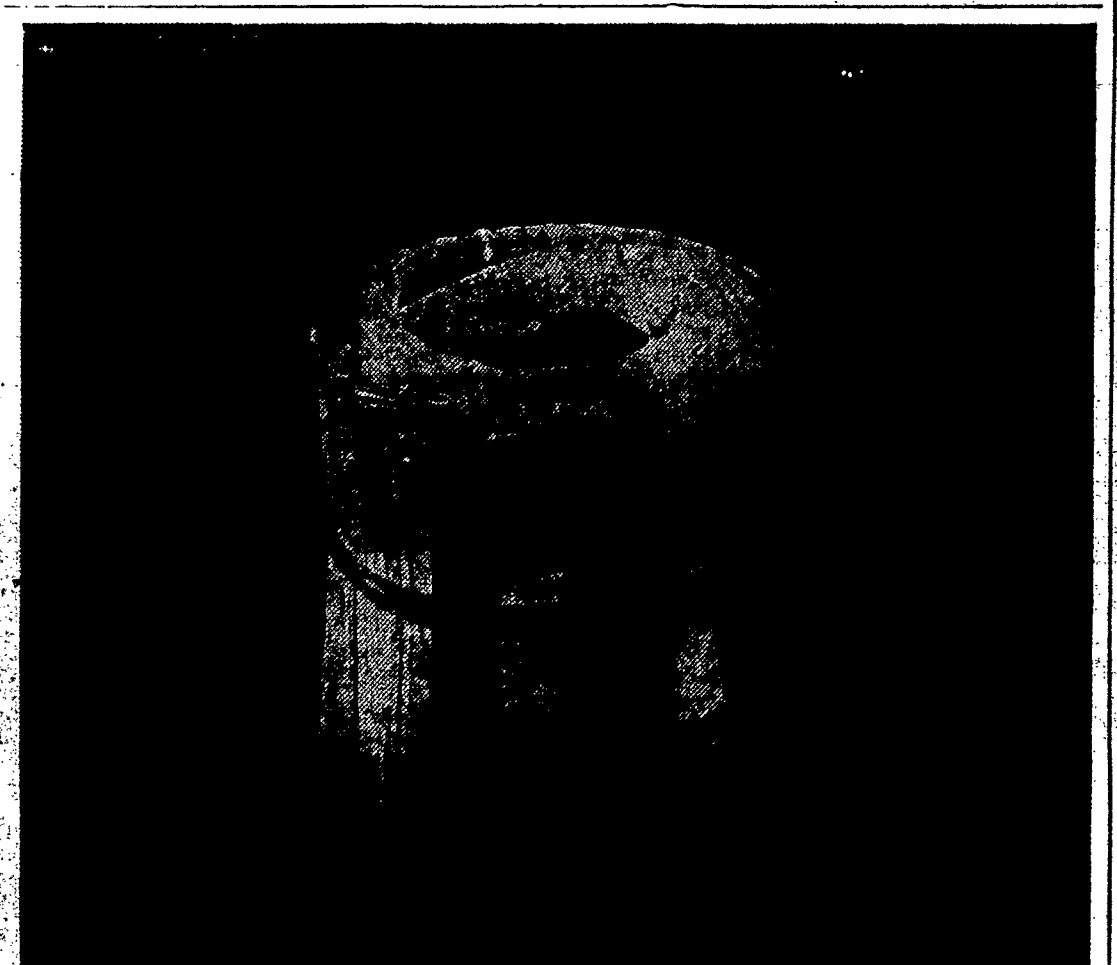

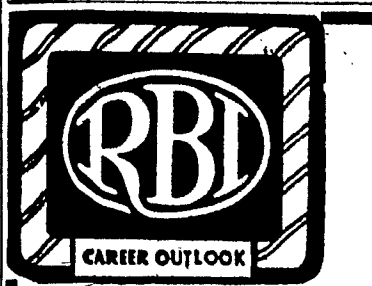
